Finance Chairman McGilvray said he was not in favour of do ing anything at this time-or at least not until the bond firm had definitely picked up the bonds optioned. However, he said as soon as this happened he would be pleased to ask the same firm if they would consider the arena debentures.

Cr. Hyde had a new twist to the arena question. He said he believed the arena could be sold. and with the money realized from the sale and the contemplated \$110,000 for renovations, a new modern building could be constructed in a place where plenty of parking space could be had.

He said the arena should be offered for sale at once and see what offer we could get.

Cr. Harrison felt it would cost \$400,000 to erect an arena, and bring it up to the standard of the present building with renovations. He said if the curling club (prospective buyers according to Cr. Hyde) would pay even \$50,000 for the building, \$150,000 would be a high price for parking area. But if the curling club will pay \$250,-000 he would like to discuss it with them.


