

Night School Display Draws Record Attendance

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A record crowd jammed Knox Presbyterian church hall Friday evening to see the articles made and displayed by the night school students. Cyril Brandford, who had the responsibility of organizing the exhibition, was given a wealth of excellent material to work with, and he and his committee put on a very fine show.

Mrs. John Glynn, chairman of the Georgetown Night School committee, welcomed the crowd which thronged the hall. Mayor Jack Armstrong was called on for an address and complimented the men and women who had taken time out of very busy lives to attend the various courses, and had created the articles which were on display. "To put effort into what you want to do," he declared, "is to make life worth living."

His worship also spoke appreciatively of the teachers. "If we did not have talented people—many of whom live in this area—who were willing to devote their time to teaching, this night school would not be the success it is."

"Not only the students," he said, "but the community as a whole, owes a debt of gratitude to the people who are making our night school such a success."

Ernie Forgrave, who represented the North Halton High School district board on the night school committee this year, reminded

those present that a public meeting would be held at the high school this April, to elect the members of the committee for the coming year. "If we want something done," he said, "we have to see it, so let's all attend this meeting on April 15th."

As the mayor phrased it "a living display of the work that had been done in the Drama-Workshop" was then presented in rehearsal, a one act play. Coffee was served during the evening. The photographers had an excellent show in the Sunday School room. Valuable equipment which included two movie cameras, two projectors, an enlarger, a print dryer and an expensive press camera, were viewed. Enlargements of candid camera shots taken by the students of work going on in other night school classes were mounted on the wall. Coloured slides were shown during the evening, among them being some taken by a student who had visited the Pacific coast last summer.

Nearby, a variety of silk screen prints formed a bank of harmonious colour. Draperies, cushions, table covers, place mats, table napkins, and tea towels were among the printed textiles, while several designs for signs or Christmas cards were shown on paper.

Across the room a striking and brilliant effect was achieved by the metal work class with gleaming, polished copper mounted against a background of dull black.

Beginners sewing had a clever and original display; and the small crisp frocks turned out by the children's sewing group were charming.

Some really ambitious work was done by the carpentry class this year. Not all of it was on view, but several chests had been brought in, and also four garden chairs which were, not only decorative, but unusually comfortable.
