A main street business changed hands this week, when Stuart Young, Phm.B., purchased the former Robb's Drug Store business. Mr. Young has been manager of the store since 1948. The business will operate under the name Young's Pharmacy.

There has been a drug store at 8 Main St. N., since 1915 when the late L. V. Hourigan first established the business. In 1923, Wray Watson, who now lives in Grimsby purchased the business, selling it in 1933 to Wesley Robb, who died in 1950. Mr. Young has served practically his entire career as a druggist there, starting as an apprentice in 1938 when he came to town from Stratford. George Webster was on the score.

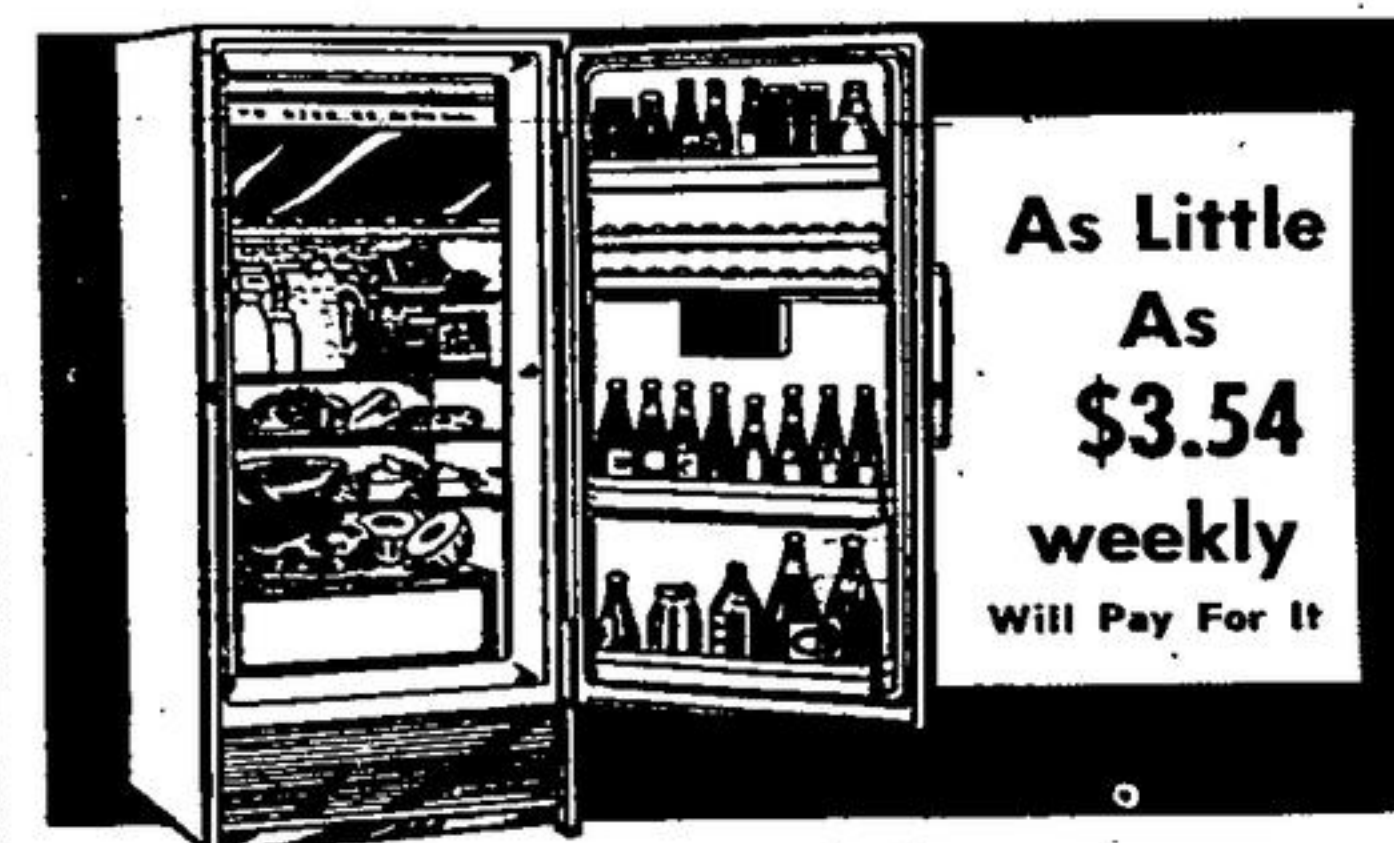
