speaks of 1,000 to 1,200 being put to work, other municipalities, a few hundred at best. There is little likelihood of the Frost Government's plan providing employment for half of those out of work, and unable to draw any unemployment insurance. The reason for this is the Frost proposals are so hedged with restrictions that they are of limited use to municipalities. For example, the government offer to share 70 per cent of the unskilled labor costs is only for expenditure over and above the amount spent for similar work last year. In other words, an area faced with long-term unemployment, such as Windsor, will be helped only to the extent that this year's outlay exceeds that spent last year. In his defence of the offer on Thursday, the premier was obviously beating a retreat. His first announcement spoke of roads, and sidewalks and bridges - many of which were impractical in winter weather, or covered by existing provincial grants. Instead the premier came up with suggestions of tree-trimming, raking of leaves, replacing floors or floor joists in washrooms, etc., etc. Little wonder the government is on the defensive. Seldom have the Tories given more graphic proof of their unwillingness to treat unemployment seriously. For as long as they could, the Tory government in both Ottawa and Queen's Park ignored unemployment, now that they can no longer ignore it, they are toying with it in a shamless effort to garner votes on March 31st.
