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### LORNE SCOT SERGEANTS HONOUR FALLEN COMRADES AT SERVICE

Some "died with their boots on" in faraway battlefields, and others survived to die at home, but they were soldiers all, and their names will live on in the Remembrance Book of the Lorne Scots Sergeants' Mess.

In an impressive ceremony at Brampton Armoury, life members of the Mess paid tribute to their former comrades and dedicated the Remembrance Book containing the names of former Warrant Officers and Sergeants.

The service was conducted by H-Capt. A. J. Calder of Georgetown, the regiment's padre. Maj. W. C. Donaldson read out the names contained in the book, and the Last Post was sounded by H. W. Robinson, Pipe Major J. Sellers played the Lament, and CSM J. Barr read McRae's immortal "In Flanders Fields." The book was placed in the crypt by the former RSM E. A. Ching, who was chairman of the evening.

Names in the book, to which others will be added with the passage of time, date back to the regiment's earlier roots, the Halton Rifles, and the Lorne Rifles (Scottish). To these have been added the names of former Mess members who served the present Peel-Dufferin and Halton regiments.

Guests at the ceremony, in addition to those participating, were Lt. Col. A. Kemp of Burlington, the Commanding Officer, and Lt. Col. Gordon Brown of Georgetown, a former CO.
