DEPARTMENT SPEAKERS AT LOWVILLE MEETING

J. E. W. A. D. Latonell, of the Conservation Branch of the Dept. of Planning and Development, and Field Officer with the Metropolitan Toronto and Region Conservation Authority, was the special speaker at a meeting held in Fairview School, Lowville, under the sponsorship of the Nelson Federation of Agriculture.

Mr. Latonell outlined the procedure in establishing a Conservation Authority on the Twelve Mile Creek or Bronte Creek, and also the advantages which could be derived from such action. Robert Marshall, chairman of the Sixteen Mile River Valley Authority, also spoke briefly on the programme, chaired by Eric Gudgeon of Lowville. Mr. Marshall reported that the 16 Mile River Valley Authority had just concluded the purchase of a 40 or 50 acre block of near virgin timber on the first line of Esquesing Township.

The proposed authority would include portions of the following municipalities: Town of Burlington (formerly Township of Nelson), Trafalgar, Bronte, Nassasa, Puslinch, East Flamborough and West Flamborough.

The meeting went on record as approving the establishment of such a Conservation Authority. The next step will involve action on the part of the Councils of the Municipalities mentioned above.
