Her fingertip veil was held by a cap head-dress trimmed with seed pearls and opalescent sequins. She carried a cascade of sweetheart roses and white carnations with white satin streamers.

Miss Marilyn Scott, of Belfountain, friend of the bride, was maid of honour. She wore a ballerina length gown of mauve organza with torso effect princess style. The theory that the dangerous duo of big Melvin Aucolin & Norm Schulz carried the Preston Junior C Pals last year got a shot in the arm Friday night as Preston minus these celebrated snipers emerged on the rough end of a 10-1 shelling at the hands of the Jr. Raiders in Preston Memorial Auditorium while 300 homers screamed their disapproval.

The nine goal margin doesn't give a fair indication of the play which is much more accurately reflected in the shots on goal, 41 by Georgetown to Preston's 37. The major factor in the Pals poor showing on the score sheet can be summed up in two words, Charlie Jewell.

At the 14 minute mark of the first period with the Jrs hanging onto a slim one goal edge, Jewell pulled off a stop that even drew praise from the partial Prestonites. Lying on the ice and sliding away from the open net after making one save, the alight Georgetown goalie caused jaws to drop all over the arena when he made a backhand stab at Schindler's second successive shot, this one from the edge of the crease, and pulled it down like he was picking peaches. He duplicated the feat in greatness in blocking at least ten other drives that seemed destined for the twine.

The newly formed line of Harrison, Cunningham and McLean, were called on to shoulder most of the load when Pomeroy crashed heavily into the boards around the 17 minute mark and had to be taken to hospital, and they came through in great style scoring 6 of the final total. Pomeroy's knee injury proved to be not as serious as it was at first feared, but it will probably keep him out of action for the remainder of the round robin.

There were 23 penalties called in the game, Georgetown drawing 10 of them. However, there was only one fight that at 14:34 of the third period when Hyde took exception to the way Daub came the width of the ice to cram him in on the boards. There were two ten minute misconduct penalties and one game misconduct, the latter being handed to Preston defenseman Okrafka when he directed a purple paragraph at referee Neil Armstrong near the start of the third period.

Preston was definitely the superior club in the early moments of the game and had the Jr. Raiders completely bottled up so that they didn't get to test Proud in the Preston net until 5:45 when Richardson rifled a shot from the blue line that hit Proud on the forehead before he could bring his glove up. The injury was not bad enough to require repairs.

Preston was playing 5 men to Georgetown's 4 when they notched the opener and their only tally of the night at 2:17 on a breakaway by Wick, who was sent into the clear by Schindler. Georgetown tied it at the 5:52 mark when Miller lobbed a soft drifter from centre ice that took a high bounce at the goal mouth and went in over Proud's elbow. Dance picked up an assist. Cunningham from Harrison at 8:34 and Cox from Baxter and McKay a couple of minutes later made it Jr. Raiders 3, Preston 1 at the end of the period.

Don Schindler relieved Proud in goal at the start of the second period but the J.R.s didn't seem to be particular who it was they scored on. Harrison and McLean each netted a pair in this stanza while Baxter and Richardson added singles. Baxter's was from Dance at 0:47 seconds, McLean from Cox and Harrison on a power play at the 5:20 mark. Harrison all alone at 10:23, McLean again from Harrison and Cunningham 14 seconds later. Proud went back in goal for Schindler at the 12 minute mark and was in a little over a minute when Richardson took McKay's pass and flipped it in after being tripped right in front of the net. Harrison continued to pile it on when he scored on a breakaway at 15:24, McKay assisting.

MANY HOGS MARKED

1104 pigs (281 groups) were marketed from the Ontario Test station for official carcass test in 1957. Of this number, which were all self-fed, 75.4 per cent qualified in advanced registry. It was interesting to note that 72.5 per cent graded 'A' compared to the all-Ontario average of 34.1 per cent 'A's. Feed consumption on the 1104 hogs was one pound live weight gain for each 3.47 lbs. of feed.
