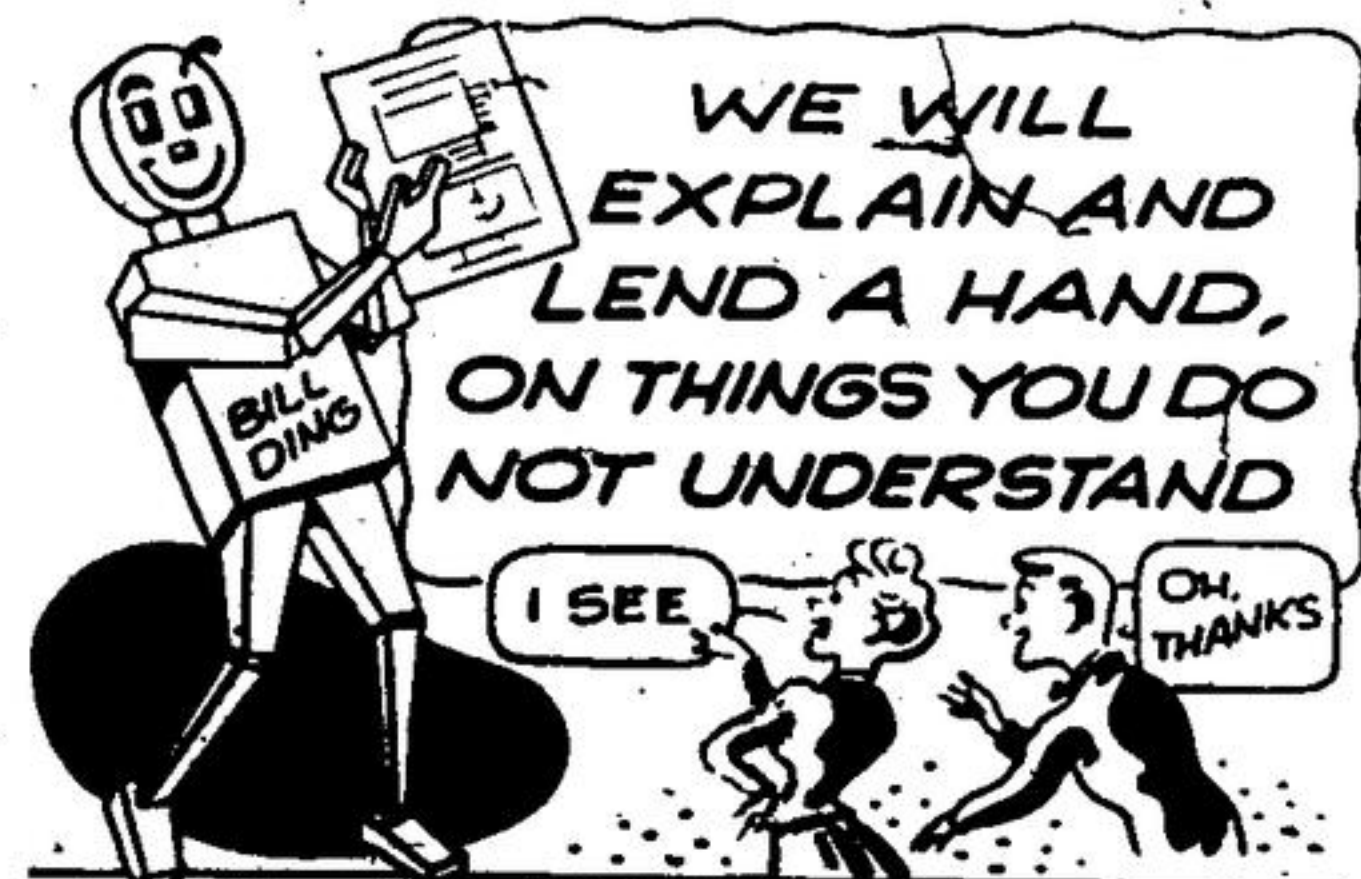

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resented the riding of North Renfrew since 1943, tendered his resignation to the Ontario Government because he has been nominated as a candidate to carry the Progressive Conservative banner in the forthcoming Dominion election campaign.

On Tuesday, March 4th, Hon. Mr. Frost tabled the signed agreements on the Hospital Services Act, between the Government of Canada and the Government of Ontario.

Hon. Louis Coellie, Minister of Public Welfare, moved second reading of a bill which it is hoped will remove the causes of the majority of contested adoption cases particularly those caused by failure of parents to realize the gravity of the decision they are called upon to make.

Mr. Allan Grossman, Progressive Conservative, St. Andrew's, Toronto, lectured the CCF opposition in the legislature for its self-righteousness. Mr. Grossman says he thinks the CCF members must have got their schooling from the wrong set of books.

Mr. Wintermeyer, Liberal, Waterloo North, in his address on the Budget, criticized the Government in a very severe manner, on the government's financing of the business of the Province of Ontario. When Mr. Wintermeyer finished his address, he moved this motion on behalf of the opposition.

That the motion "That Mr. Speaker do now leave the Chair and the House resolve itself into Committee of Supply" be amended by adding thereto the following words:

"But this House regrets that the Budget does not in any way recognize or solve the fundamental fiscal problem of the Province of Ontario in its rapid evolution from an agricultural to an industrial economy and in particular lacks imaginative leadership in the solution of:

1. Municipal-provincial fiscal relations.
2. A long-range program for highway construction and financing.
3. A failure to devise a plan for managing the ever-rising debt."

This motion will not be voted on until the debate on the Budget is finished.

Hon. Kelso Roberts, attorney-general, gave the estimates for the Ontario Provincial Police Force in the Province of Ontario of seventeen hundred and thirty officers. This police force is looked upon as one of the finest police forces in Canada.

Hon. Charles Daley, minister of labour, gave an address on labour relations between the workers and industry. Before presenting the estimates for the Dept. of Labour, Hon. Mr. Daley, made it quite clear that in his opinion there was not the great gap between worker and employer that some people would lead you to believe. The majority of the heads of industry today all started in a very humble position in industry, and many of them never had the privilege of obtaining courses in higher learning.

Much of the time of the legislature is being taken up with the presentation of estimates of the different Departments of Government.

There are twenty-two different departmental estimates to be presented. These combined estimates, both statutory and non-statutory, amount to a total of \$932,946,000. This is the largest volume of Provincial Government business for any one year in the history of the Province of Ontario.

A Bill presented by Queen's University, Kingston, caused a very hot debate, both in Committee and in the Assembly. Queen's University were asking for the right to appropriate property for extension to the University. This has been a very hot subject both at this time and in former sessions of the legislature. These universities must expand to keep pace with the great development of the Province of Ontario.

If I might interject my own opinion, I believe diplomacy used at the right time will create better relationships than an act of Parliament.

The Queen's University Bill was passed Friday morning, March 7. Goodbye for the present and hoping you will not forget that Monday next is St. Patrick's Day.

FIREMEN TO GLEN FIRE WEDNESDAY LAST
Damage was contained to electrical wiring and floor joist last Wednesday at noon when fire broke out in the cellar of a house owned by Bud Bishop, R.R.1 Glen Williams.

Smoke was so heavy in the cellar that Georgetown firemen had to don their smoke masks to get at the flames, which threatened to raze the entire house.

The blaze is believed to have originated with the old electric stove in the basement which was accidentally turned on. The stove was not being used and had been piled with rubbish. The fire was reported at approximately 10 to 1 and the Georgetown brigade was on the scene minutes later.

Norval Junior Farmer Hockey Playoffs Cancelled

An incident which cropped up in the final period of the playoff game between Palermo and Norval Junior Farmers has resulted in the cancellation of all remaining games and consequently no championship will be decided this season.

The incident occurred at 19.20 of the third period in the final game of the finals when with Palermo out in front of Norval 9 to 6 a fight broke out between Palermo's Dave Murray and Bill Richardson of Norval after Murray had crashed Richardson into the boards, and Richardson had retaliated. Richardson was given a 2 minute slashing penalty, while Murray ended up with 12 minutes, 2 for boarding, 5 for fighting and a ten minute misconduct.

Norval protested Murray's action, and threatened to drop from the league unless the Palermo player was barred from playing for the rest of the season while Palermo threatened that if such a move was made they would refuse to play the remaining games. An emergency meeting of the club representatives reached no decision while league president Earl Wilson declined to cast the deciding vote because he was not neutral being a member of the Norval team. The deadlock meant the end of Junior farmer hockey for this year.

In the game, two goals by Bill Donaldson and singles by Hughie Cunningham and Fred Barnes gave Norval a 4-1 lead at the end of the first period. Bob Marshall scoring the only Palermo goal, in the second session Palermo roared back with four quick tallies, two by Bob Marshall and 2 by Don Vivian to take over the lead.

Earl Wilson and Hughie Cunningham brought Norval's output to six while Bob Marshall, Don Vivian, Dave Murray, and Vivian again boosted the Palermo cause before the flareup in the final minute of play.
