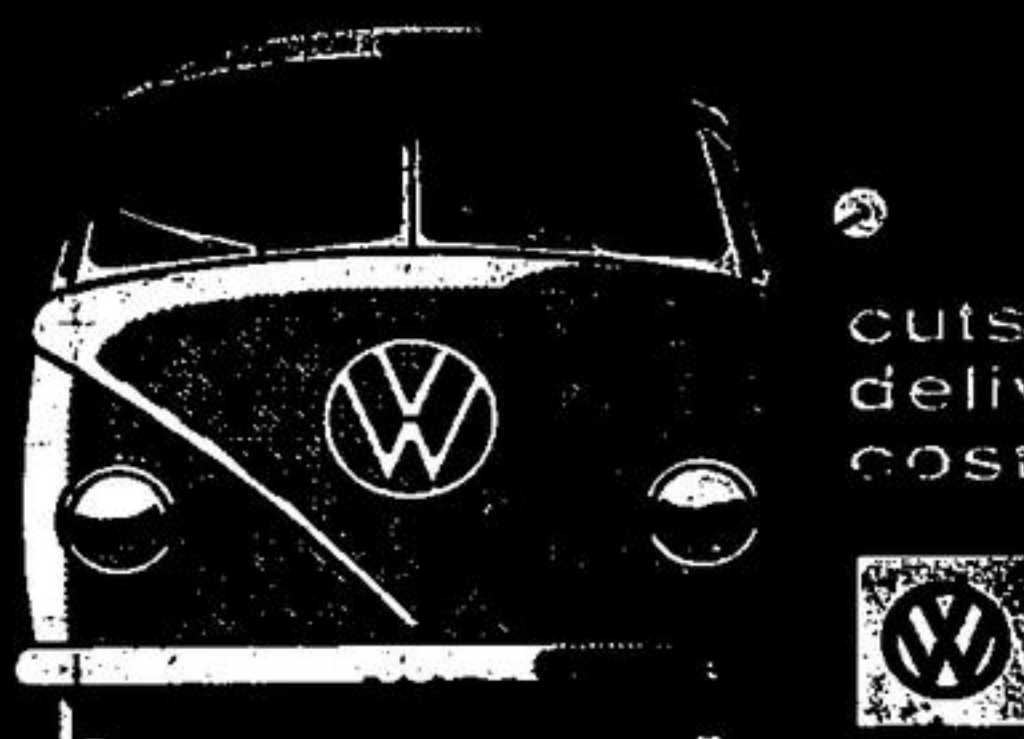

Mr. Hamilton said at the meeting television is not harmful to children's eyes and on the contrary helps to develop the eye muscles. A lengthy question period followed his talk.

Mr. Hamilton was introduced to the meeting by Mrs. Al Currie. Mrs. Tom Golden and Mrs. Fred Johnson served refreshments at the conclusion of the meeting.
