FARM FORUMS FARMERS MUST SHOW INTEREST IN FEDERATION

National farm radio forum based on the recent annual meeting of the Canadian Federation of Agriculture was "Do you feel the Canadian Federation of Agriculture is developing policies representative of the views of Canadian farmers?" The gentlemen on the broadcast stressed the fact that many farmers, particularly the juniors know very little about the organization and function of C.F.A.

With the exception of one group the farmers in Halton county felt the C.F.A. was working in the interest of Canadian farmers. Some groups emphasized the lack of interest shown by the farmers themselves. The great need for success is the whole-hearted support of all farmers.

One forum suggested a better understanding might be established if resolutions for consideration at the provincial annual meeting were sent to Toronto three months in advance of the meeting. They would then be sent-out for discussion among county directors. In this way delegates would be in a better position to express the opinions of the members they represent.

Education through TV, the press and the various commodity marketing and producer groups should make farmers more conscious of the potential benefits of the federation if they give it their support.

IN THE MAIL BAG HALTON WRITER SETS OUT LIBERAL ELECTION POLICIES

When times and business conditions were good, the Liberal Government taxed us so as to show a budgetary surplus... which went to reduce Canada's national debt. The Liberals argued that good times justified this taxation policy so as to economically allow deficit budgeting... occasioning the increase of our national debt... when, as, and if times and business conditions became demonstrably poor.

The Conservative party, when in Her Majesty's Official Opposition, long railed that such a tax policy, resulting as it did in year-end cash surplus (times were never better) meant that the Government took the attitude that it could spend and conserve the taxpayers money better than the taxpayers could not be relied upon to use good judgment in spending their own money... so the government must do it for them.

So comes poorer times... so comes an election. So also comes the Conservative party into Government and the Liberals are Her Majesty's official opposition. And all agree that deficit financing is now justified. Both parties would support the necessity of returning some of the tax dollars concerned in good times to be spent in the present poor times.

But what do we find to be the policy of the Conservative party in Government? A return to the taxpayer of tax dollars taken from him by the Government's "wrong" policy of the past? ... a tax cut? A dribble... a mere \$75 million, while \$1 billion \$185 to cover the geographic, political water front!

Thus it can be seen that the Conservative Party consider the taxpayer 'capable' of spending but 86c on his own behalf, while the Conservative Government, in its own lofty wisdom, would have us believe that it knows best how to spend the other 94c.

On the other hand, what is the Liberal party platform they would have the electorate approve on March 31st... those who would not deny that tax surplus had been their responsibility and a reduction thereby of our national debt by over \$2 billions of dollars.

An income tax reduction for all taxpayers of \$500 million now, when times and business conditions demonstrate the necessity. This represents over 500 per cent greater confidence in the native intelligence of the taxpayers of Canada to spend their own money than the Conservatives demonstrate.

To quote a phrase of the past "Not by Words Alone, but Deeds, We Shall Count"... if the results of March 31st voting is to record recognition of consistency with platform, then the foregoing bespeaks support of Mike Pearson and the Liberal party.

The Conservatives have shown a split personality depending who they are in power or just wanting to get in. The Liberal Party, renewed by a man who has brought prestige and confidence to the term "Canadian" the world over, offer now the corollary to turn directly to the taxpayer of his tax dollar with no strings attached at a time when they said they would.

Fort Erie Jr. C's showed some of the authority they wielded in knocking off all the Jr. B teams in the Niagara peninsula when they bounced the Jr. Raiders by a convincing 8 to 5 count in a hard fought contest at Georgetown arena last Tuesday, March 4th. It was the first clash between the two clubs in the home & home Round Robin elimination series involving Fort Erie, Preston and Georgetown and the second win in as many games for the Fort who crushed Preston 10-5 in the opener at Preston on March 1st.

Fort Erie first indicated that they were a different team than the one that lost 4-2 to the J.R.s in a pre-season exhibition tilt in the first period when Georgetown's backchecking, which was the murder weapon for the J.R.s at Fort Erie had about as much effect as rain on a duck.

A 400 pound defensive wall, namely Harry Elliott and Big Mike Potyak kept Georgetown from wandering in too far on goalie Gerry Mulholland when they did get a chance and as a result most of the 33 shots that were chalked up for the Jr. Raiders were from well out or from an almost impossible angle.

It was the few Fort Erie long drives that did the damage to the J.R.s since at least 3 of the 8 that got by Lockhurst were launched from over twenty feet out.

Lockhurst was completely screened on Fort Erie's first goal, an ice-hugger that Mike McGuire rifled through a maze of skates after Elliott fed him from the corner at 10:15.

Erratic passing by the Jr. Raiders killed numerous threats to tie it up before Ross Cunningham who led the team last year in assists relayed to McLean who rapped it by Mulholland before he could make a move on it. That was scored at 12:25.

Doug Richardson brought the crowd to their feet when he just missed putting Georgetown out in front two minutes later with a high, hard one that hit the crossbar and then carromed off the goal post to Elliott who cleared it down the ice.

Elliott was sitting out an elbowing penalty when Pomeroy banged in a Richardson pass and put the J.R.s ahead for exactly 55 seconds when Jim Driver knotted it at 2-all, Elliott assisting. Fort Erie was still short-handed when they scored the equalizer.

Gil Pilote from Norm Rouse made it 3-2 for Fort Erie at 6:24 of the second frame just after King got the gate for tripping, and it wasn't until 16:35 that they added their 4th tally. Hutton getting this one from Rouse while playing 5 men to Georgetown's 3.

The teams were at full strength when Richardson raked in Cox's pass and let a bullet go from the left boards that went in off Mulholland's skate with less than a minute to go to keep it close going into the third.

The Jr. Raiders came out on the rough end of a fast four goal exchange that started at the 5:30 mark and ended at 7:35. Rouse picked up a pair and Mahon added a single for the Fort while Georgetown managed only one, that off the stick of Cunningham, at 6:52. When the smoke cleared it was Fort Erie 7 Georgetown 4.

Each team added-once to their total before it was all over. Ehrmann all alone at 14:27 and McLean on King's rebound at 19:24.
