## "NEIGHBOURLY NEWS" HAS NEW BROADCASTER

Arthur Phelps, noted broadcaster and literary critic, is the new voice of "Neighbourly News", broadcast each Sunday on the CBC Trans-Canada network at 10 a.m. EST. Mr. Phelps is replacing Don Fairbairn who has withdrawn from the program for health reasons. The radio career of Mr. Phelps dates back to 1935 when he did a series of talks for the CBC in Winnipeg. On "Neighbourly News" he will broadcast the human interest part of the news from Ontario and Quebec communities gleaned from the weekly newspapers. The son of a Methodist minister, Mr. Phelps was born in Columbus, Ontario, and was educated at Lindsay Collegiate and the University of Toronto, graduating in 1913. Following - post-graduate work

he entered the ministry. He resigned to accept a post as assistant professor of English at Cornell College in Iowa in the fall of 1920. A year later Mr. Phelps moved to United College at the University of Manitoba in Winnipeg, serving as head of the English Department at McGill University in Montreal. He retired from McGill in 1953 but continues to lecture. He is a special lecturer in English at the University of Toronto and has also lectured at the University of British Columbia in Vancouver and at Queen's University at Kingston. The program 'Neighbourly News' is one of the oldest on Canadian radio - it has been broadcast continuously for 19 years with Reid Forsee as the producer, a job he will continue to do.
