Dresden or Windsor? Expect Playoff to Start Here Saturday

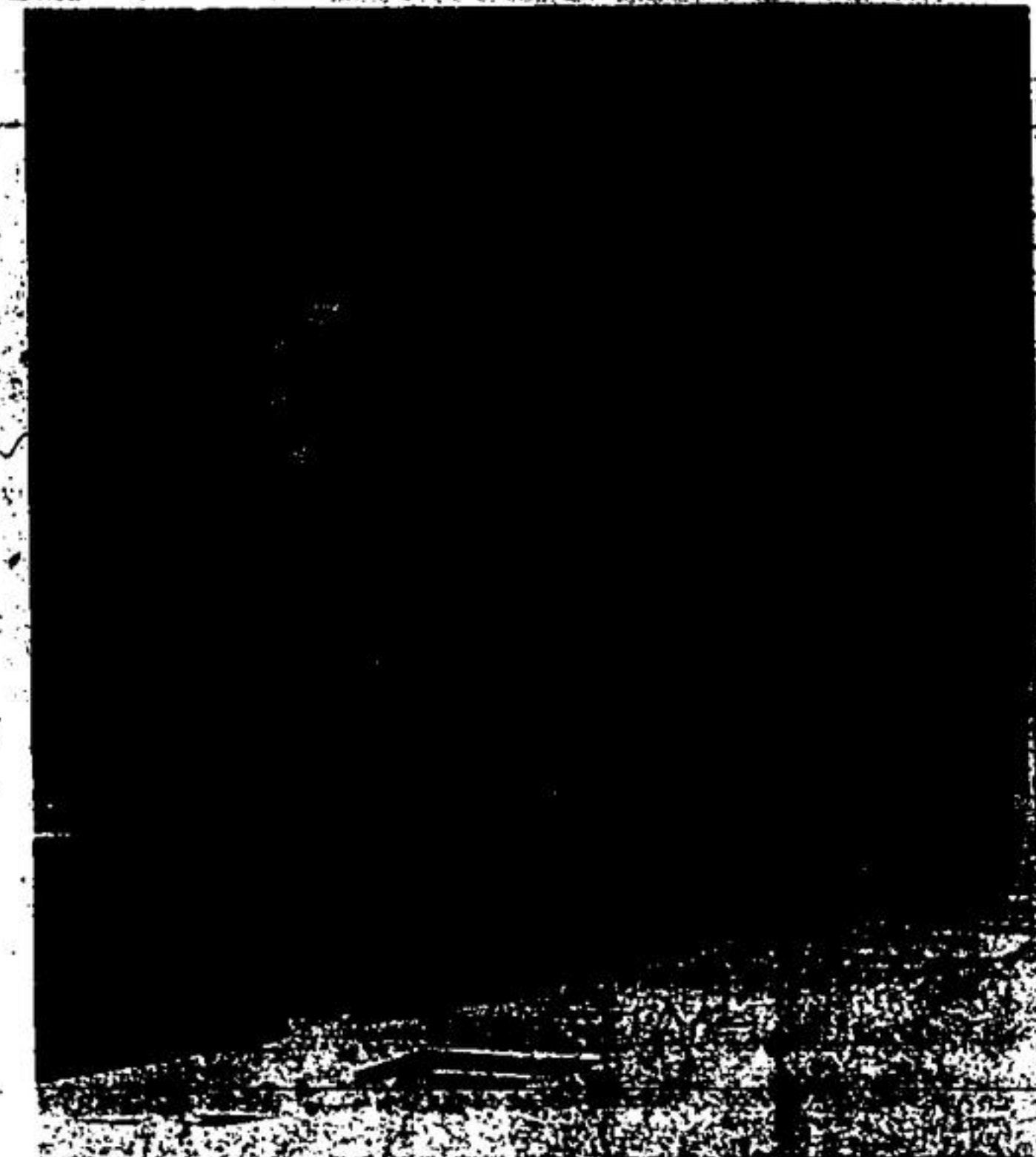

HAIRDRESSERS ATTEND CONVENTION IN TORONTO

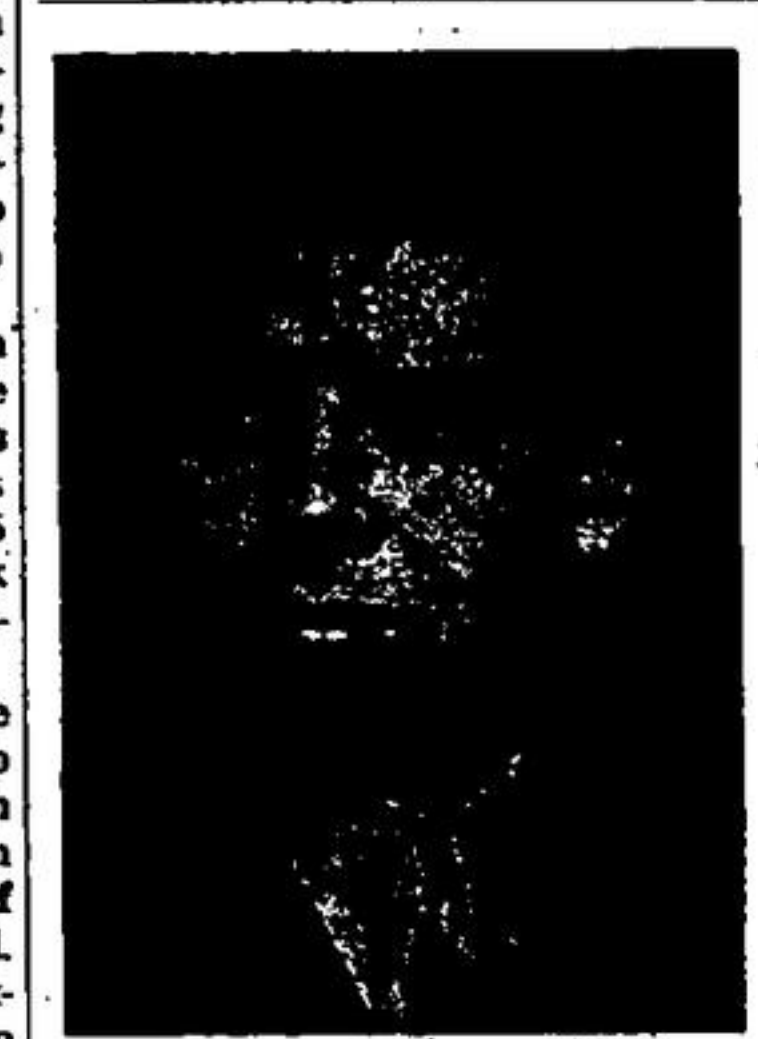
