Richardson Breaks Arm Juniors Lose Top Sniper

The Junior Raiders lost more than a hockey game here Friday night when Preston upset them 5 to 3 to stay even with Georgetown in the round robin elimination series. They lost the services of their top sniper, Doug Richardson, probably for the remainder of the season.

Richardson broke his right arm midway through the game when he went down hard after colliding with Okrafka. He got up and played the rest of the match with the fracture which wasn't discovered until an x-ray of the arm on Monday revealed the break. The injury left Glen Dance as the only healthy member of the J.R.s starting line since Pomeroy was knocked out of action when he suffered a torn cartilage in his right knee in Preston less than two weeks ago, however, he is expected to be back in the lineup soon.

Bob Cox, who emerged for the series as the local's best defence man, was also injured in the game. He suffered a deep gash over his left eye when he got nicked by a skate with just five seconds to go in the game. The cut required a lot of needle work but won't keep him out of the up coming series with Fort Erie.

Fort Erie assured Georgetown of a spot in the playoffs by downing Preston 10-4 on Saturday night in Preston to close out the elimination. Preston and Georgetown finished with identical records, however the J.R.s edged out the Prestonites on their better goal average.
