## Chamber Deserves Support ...

The annual meeting of the Chamber of Commerce will take a somewhat different form this year, with an evening dinner planned at the golf club next Tuesday at which J. T. A. Wilson, manager of the Ontario Chamber will speak.

It is a meeting which should have a bumper attendance, not only of present members but of those who should be members. One does not have to be a merchant or an industrialist to be a C of C member. 
