## Queen's Pk. Report

Your Assembly started this week's proceedings by presenting estimates of different departments. To give you the extent of growth in the last few years of the Province of Ontario, the estimates of the Province of Ontario's Government for 1958 are larger than the estimates of the Government of Canada for the year of 1957.

Mr. A. Wren, Liberal Labour for Kenora, challenged the leader of the CCF, Mr. MacDonald, to substantiate the truth of the statements he made about municipal officials in the Kenora district. Mr. MacDonald had no reply.

Mr. MacDonald, leader of the CCF party made statements in the Assembly about the retirement of the Hon. Philip T. Kelly, former minister of mines. Mr. MacDonald implied that Mr. Kelly's connection with certain development companies made it imperative that he should resign.

When Mr. Kelly's resignation was read by the prime minister, it showed clearly that the charges made by Mr. MacDonald were unfounded.

The Hon. Louis P. Ceille, Minister of Public Welfare, in presenting the estimates for the Department of Public Welfare, said that his Department will distribute to the different citizens and organizations

of Ontario, the huge sum of one million dollars every week for the year 1958. The huge sum of fifty four million dollars is shared by our government of Canada.

Province of Ontario, 43 per cent. Gov't. of Canada, 57 per cent.

The Hon. W. J. Dunlop, Minister of Education, explaining the Bill which provided a sum of money of three million dollars for students to secure loans to further their education in institutions of higher learning, said that the resident qualifications would be one year.

This should be of great value to new Canadians, wishing to avail themselves of this assistance.

The Hon. W. J. Dunlop, Minister of Education, in presenting the estimates for the Dept. of Education, made a statement which should be of great interest to the citizens of Halton County.

The Dept. of Education has purchased ninety seven acres of land on No. 25 highway, just south of Halton Manor. On this property will be erected a school for the deaf, at a cost of approximately two million dollars. I am sure you people will agree with me that the Dept. of Education made no mistake in picking the site for this school in the County of Halton.

Dr. Dunlop also stated in his remarks that we have night school for new Canadians in twenty-seven centres, with an enrolment of twenty-five thousand students. Some of these students are attending schools of higher learning.

The Prime Minister, the Hon. Leslie Frost, stated in the Assembly on Friday, March 14th, that next week an oil portrait of the late Hon. Mitchell Hepburn would be unveiled in the Parliament Bldgs. and that Mrs. Hepburn and other members of the Hepburn family would be present.

Mr. Monaghan, Progressive Conservative, in his address said that in his opinion the Dept. of Labour should set up a Workmen's Compensation Board in Northern Ontario. I am inclined to agree with Mr. Monaghan, when you consider the number of people employed at Sudbury, Sault Ste. Marie, Port Arthur, Fort William, Timmins and many more industrial centres. To have this convenience in the north would save the workmen of the north a lot of miles of travel, which at the present time is costing them a lot of both time and money.

## Auction Would Be Fair ...

Varying opinions on disposing of municipal property to private buyers have been expressed in council. It has been customary in the past, when a person wishes to purchase such land, to submit an offer which council considers and accepts or rejects. A new system adopted will not consider any such offer until the land has been advertised for sale, and tenders received from any interested parties.

A further improvement which could be suggested would be to sell any land which council wishes to dispose of by public auction. This, better than any other method, should realize the most money for the town, while giving every buyer an equal chance at acquiring the property. A reserve bid should be made by the town, of course, so there would be no danger of the land not bringing what council considers a fair price.

## A Political Highlight ...

Something the Herald has advocated many times will occur when the three political candidates seeking Halton's federal seat will appear on the speaking platform of Wrigglesworth School.

It is the first time in our memory that this has happened in Georgetown, and is certainly a "first" for the last quarter century. It will be a pity if the auditorium is not jammed to the doors with people displaying an interest in national affairs.

East Georgetown Ratepayers can be thanked for bringing this attraction to town. While planned as a feature of one of their regular monthly meetings, it has been thrown open to the general public. Sandy Best, MP, who was elected to parliament for the Progressive-Conservatives last year Ken Dick, Liberal and Jack Henry, CCF have all agreed to speak. For them, too, it will be a novelty, for instead of speaking to an audience largely composed of their own party followers, they each will have an opportunity to present their views to a politically-mixed group of men and women.

It is to be hoped that the meeting will become the rule rather than the exception in future elections and we congratulate the ratepayers organization for inaugurating such an evening.

## Chamber Deserves Support ...

The annual meeting of the Chamber of Commerce will take a somewhat different form this year, with an evening dinner planned at the golf club next Tuesday at which J. T. A. Wilson, manager of the Ontario Chamber will speak.

It is a meeting which should have a bumper attendance, not only of present members but of those who should be members. One does not have to be a merchant or an industrialist to be a C of C member. The Chamber, as a "booster" organization, is better for having diversity in its membership and it should appeal to any man or woman who thinks Georgetown is a good place to live and can be a better place through organized promotion.

The Chamber of Commerce has many fauets. Its primary purpose is to promote Georgetown in every way possible. To date membership has not been large, but those who belong have been keen and each year a healthy growth in numbers and activity.

Last year, for instance, the park gates, a joint Women's Institute-Chamber project were completed and dedicated; the Chamber shared costs of an industrial promotion advertisement in a special issue of the Financial Post; a Christmas lighting and store decoration campaign was promoted; support was given the Santa Claus parade; and waste containers were placed at strategic locations in the business districts.

Driving in the States recently, we were struck by the number of towns, some of them smaller than ours, which had permanent offices, and presumably a paid staff, handling Chamber affairs. While this may not be feasible here, it is amazing what can be accomplished by volunteer labour, providing there are enough volunteers to share the work.

We suggest that you attend next Tuesday's meeting to hear from an expert what Chambers are doing and can do.

## FARM NEWS

### MAPLE CATTLE BREEDERS HAVE 940 CATTLE MEMBERS

Little did we think back in early 1947 when the Halton Branch of the Maple Cattle Breeders Association was organized, that we would ever see the day when that organization would have 940 members in the little county of Halton.

That was one of the amazing facts revealed by secretary A. E. Snider at the annual meeting of the Halton branch held in the Court House, Milton, on Thursday afternoon of last week. It was actually the first annual meeting of the Halton branch since the amalgamation a little over a year ago of the old Maple Cattle Breeders' Association and the Toronto district cattle breeders into the Central Ontario Cattle Breeders' Association.

General manager Dr. C. R. Reeds, president Walter Halliday, and his board of directors, have had a lot of adjustments and problems to 'iron out' since the amalgamation of the two units. Frankly, we feel they have done an amazing job. During the year outstanding accounts owing by the 10,969 members of the Association have been trimmed down from over \$70,000 to some \$15,000.

**\$450,000 Business**  
 During the past year nearly 82,000 cows were inseminated by the COCBA — of this number, 8,478 Halton cows were inseminated. It is little less than marvelous, that working on a \$5.00 insemination fee, a gross turn over of nearly half a million dollars was realized in 1957.

Still on \$5.00 Fee Basis  
 The \$5.00 service fee per cow was established back in 1945. We can't help but wonder if there are any

other commodities that can be bought for the same price as in 1945.

**Attendance Poor**  
 In our opinion there was only one thing wrong with the Halton meeting — and that was the attendance. Perhaps the poor attendance indicates complete satisfaction. Be that as it may, we fail to see much justification of organizing a county meeting unless a larger percentage of the members show more interest. Perhaps the Halton members can redeem themselves by attending the annual meeting of the parent organization, scheduled for the Community Hall Centre at Maple, on Monday, March 24th, where Prof. J. C. Steckley is to be the guest speaker.
