**Movie Projectionist
Once Businessman Here**

A former Georgetown businessman and once movie projectionist at the old Rex Theatre, Ernest Edward Young, 69 died on March 13th in Toronto.

A movie projectionist over half a century, Mr. Young was a native of Swansea, Wales. Coming to Georgetown in 1923, he ran the silent movies when the Rex was the popular entertainment spot in the building which now houses the Odd Fellows Hall. Later he had a confectionery store on Main St. in the present Sienko shoe repair store.

Leaving Georgetown in 1941, he lived at Trenton for two years, then at Peterborough where he was projectionist at the Odeon Theatre. He was a member of the Anglican church and the IOOF lodge.

He leaves one son, SSGT. Allan Young, stationed at Toronto Military Hospital, and grandchildren Jany and David. His wife died in 1952 and he was also predeceased by two brothers, Walter and Tudor of Swansea, Wales.

Archdeacon Ongley conducted the funeral service on March 15 in St. John's Anglican Church, Peterborough and interment was in Little Lake Cemetery there.

**William Tarzwell
Was Erin Resident**

After a lengthy illness William Tarzwell of Erin died on Thursday, March 20th, in Guelph General Hospital at the age of sixty-seven. His parents were the late Elizabeth and George Tarzwell of Hillsburgh where he lived until moving to Erin eighteen years ago. He and Mrs. Tarzwell, the former Annie McArthur, who survives him farmed in the district for many years. Their children also are left, Helen (Mrs. John Hernes) Port Credit, Alex, Jean (Mrs. Jack Morrow) and Bernice all of Georgetown. Three brothers and one sister also survive, Robert, Hillsburgh, Tom and Clayton of Toronto and Pearl (Mrs. George Tilcox) of Hillsburgh and eight grandchildren.

The funeral service was conducted in the Burns Presbyterian Church on Saturday, March 22nd at 2 p.m. by Rev. Hawk of that church and the minister of the Disciple Church. Pallbearers were George Tarzwell, George Tilcox, Fred Tarzwell, Frank Root, Frank Cunningham and Walter Binnie. Interment was in Erin cemetery.

**Institute Organizer
Was Noted
County Historian**

An authority on Halton County history, Miss Elizabeth Anne Appelbe, 88, died March 17th after a lengthy illness, at the home of her niece, Mrs. C. A. Grant, Stewarttown.

Miss Appelbe was the daughter of John Appelbe and Elizabeth Richie Fleming, who were both members of pioneer Halton families, and was born on the 3rd Line, Esquesing. She obtained her schooling at Stewarttown, Georgetown continuation school and Brampton high school. Keenly interested in history, she had a lifetime collection of documents and historical writings of priceless value, and was considered

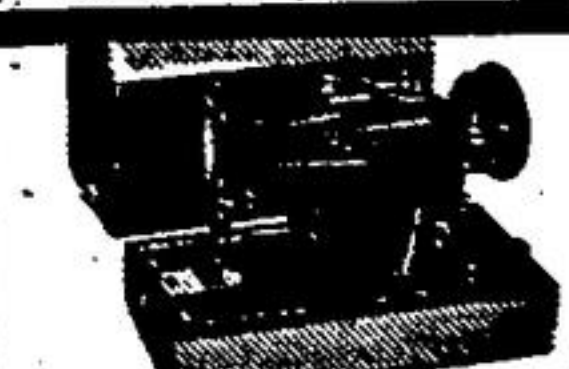
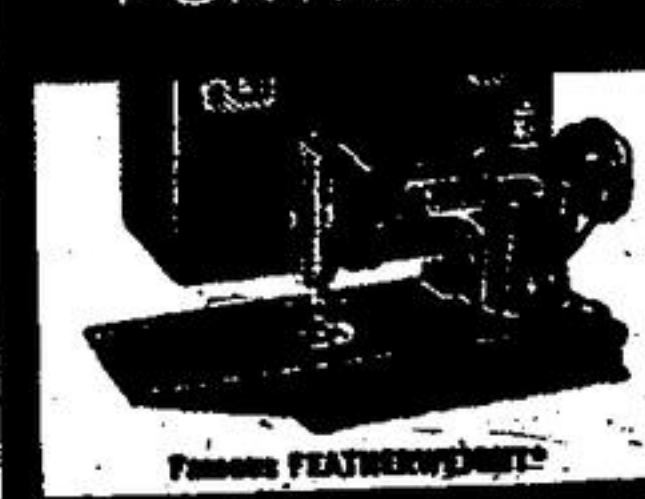
the top authority on the early history of the Georgetown district particularly. She was well-known in Women's Institute circles as an organizer and for twelve years was provincial convener of historical research. She was a life member of Esquesing Women's Institute and a member of the Ontario Historical Society.

Most of her life was spent in her native township, but she had also lived in Hamilton, Toronto, Montreal and Georgetown. For the past 8 1/2 years she made her home with Mr. and Mrs. Grant at Stewarttown. She was an Anglican and a W.A. member in Hamilton and Toronto. She leaves one sister, Mrs. A. J. Smethurst, of Limehouse.

Rev. J. E. Maxwell conducted the funeral service in St. John's Anglican Church, Stewarttown, on March 19 followed by interment in Greenwood Cemetery, Georgetown. The church choir took part in the service. Pallbearers were John Murray and Henry Shepherd who were members of her Sunday School class in boyhood, Ross Thompson, Joe Standish, Dick Licata and Ken Lee.
