## Injury-Ridden Juniors Enlist Midgets for Game

Fort Erie had little trouble in matching the first win of the Ontario Junior C semi-finals away from the Georgetown Jr. Raiders in Fort Erie Thursday night, pasting them 9 to 2 in easy fashion. Grady Hutton, who many Fort Erie fans picked for the most valuable player award, over Mike McGuire, led the onslaught with 3 goals while McMahon, Wiggins, Potyak, Pilote Ehrmann, and Elliott each added a nail in the Jr.'s coffin. Georgetown's two tallies were netted by Pomeroy and Cunningham.

It was the old story of the Fort Erie defence-making like a brick wall as Georgetown managed an 18 shots on Mulholland, 6 in the first period, 8 in the second and just 4 in the disastrous finale. Ft. Erie got to Lockhurst 38 times.

It was a desperation salad of midget and second string juniors that coach Bill Chard served up to the Fort Erie club and they didn't make any attempt to hide their appetite. The big maroon and gold team got their first taste at 2:57 and Game back for 8 more helpings and the service was terrific, with the exception of Marshall and Riddell who were the only two on the ice who made a real effort to put an end to the feast.

The midgets in the lineup, Riddell, Henderson and Popiel, were brought up to fill some of the holes left through injuries but even with them on the roster plus Marshall and Auger who didn't get too much action through the regular season, Fort Erie still managed to see plenty of daylight.

Hutton was first to dent the mesh, scoring from Pilote and Wiggins at 2:57 with Wiggins counting the second one from Pilote at the 3:20 mark before Georgetown had even had a shot on net. In fact it wasn't until the 10-minute mark that the fans realized there was a goalie at the Fort Erie end of the ice when Georgetown tested Mulholland for the first time while they had a man advantage. The teams were 6 a side when Fort Erie fattened their lead on a goal by Mike Potyak at 13:01. Jim Driver and Hutton picked up the assists.

Marshall was sitting out a slashing penalty when the Jr. Raiders burst the bubble. Pomeroy scoring on a breakaway at 9:27. McGuire had scored for Fort Erie just 30 seconds before but the goal was disallowed because half the Fort Erie team was in the crease.

Pilote threaded a shot through a maze of players, Elliott's relayed pass from McGuire at 10:27 that beat Lockhurst and less than a minute later Ehrmann took Driver's rink wide pass and notched Fort Erie's 5th goal just after Hyde got the gate for tripping.

McMahon from McGuire and Potyak at 48 seconds of the third period put an end to any designs Georgetown had drawn up for a late rally and from there on out it was just a case of how many goals. Hutton scored from Pilote 2:47 and then completed his hat trick from Pilote and McGuire at 8:15. Elliott got the last Fort Erie goal from the blue line at 9:24 but the Jr.s had the last word when a Dance to Harrison to Cunningham pass pattern clicked with 4 seconds left in the game. There were 17 penalties in the match, Georgetown picking up eight.

## WHAT COUNCIL DID

### Edwards to Whitby Police, Rollins is New Constable

E. S. Rollins has joined the local police force as a constable, replacing K. G. Edwards, whose resignation was received Mar. 17, after only a month on the job. Mr. Edwards is leaving for a position with Whitby police force. Mr. Rollins was one of the men considered for the job when Mr. Edwards was hired and replaced him when he left last week-end. Married, and father of a 13-year-old daughter, he served with the army provost corps from 1946 to 1967 and has also served as a summer constable in Ennisfield Township.

Council has called for tenders for a new ambulance which will cost in the vicinity of \$4500. Cr. John Gunn, head of council's ambulance committee, explained at the meeting that using the current rate of calls as a yardstick, an \$1800 estimated yearly revenue will obviate taking money from the tax revenue for ambulance service. The present vehicle will be used as an auxiliary machine.

Council will ask Savard & Hart, Inc., a Montreal brokerage firm, if they would buy a \$110,000 debenture issue, the money to be used for arena remodelling.

Cr. Harrison, who made the suggestion, said that the arena will become a 12-month recreation centre if the money can be borrowed, and that unless something is done with the building, there is danger that the fire marshal will order it closed. A plebiscite two years ago gave the taxpayers blessing to the project which has been delayed because money could not be borrowed.

A town employee, William Walker was re-engaged as weed inspector at a yearly fee of \$50.

Complaining of a poor road on Rexway Drive, Harold Rossiter, whose home is in that area was promised some relief by the road committee.

Hard surfacing last year had lasted only a few weeks, he said, and heavy equipment used when new homes were being constructed had completely wrecked it. Mr. Rossiter complained also that the dust nuisance is terrible in the area. Some councillors felt that contractors responsible should be charged with the repairs, and it was left to the road committee to deal with. Cr. Harrison suggested in future a road not be accepted by the town until an area is completely built up.

Possibility of obtaining 70% subsidy on wages of unemployed residents employed in sidewalk construction will be further investigated. A letter from the provincial government said this would be allowable, but cited a long list of conditions which have to be met and led Reeve Sargent to term the new provincial legislation "a beautiful sham."

The town engineer was asked to estimate cost of some 5000 feet of sidewalks so that application can be made to the government for a subsidy.

Notified by the engineer that the town owns no right-of-way across the CNR tracks between Main St. and the 9th Line, council will consult the town solicitor to see what costs and liability might be entailed if a public crossing were created, and will ask Burlington and Oakville how similar crossings were engineered in those towns.

A letter from the public school board pointed out what could happen in the school situation if lands are indiscriminately released for new housing. Present schools and the new Park school and Harrison addition will take care of school population only in the present released Delrex area and the proposed Lane subdivision, the board said. The board said its letter was not intended to hurt any development, but only as information for council's guidance.
