





Voters should note that the polls close at 6 p.m. Monday, rather than 7 p.m. as in the last election when daylight saving was in effect. The program consisted of various selections by the band as whole and a number of solo and duet selections.


The band played three lovely hymns, four stirring marches, a Polish folk song and the lighthearted selection, "Ain't We got


