A similar event is being held in the same hall by the members of the Golden Guernsey Club on April 2nd.



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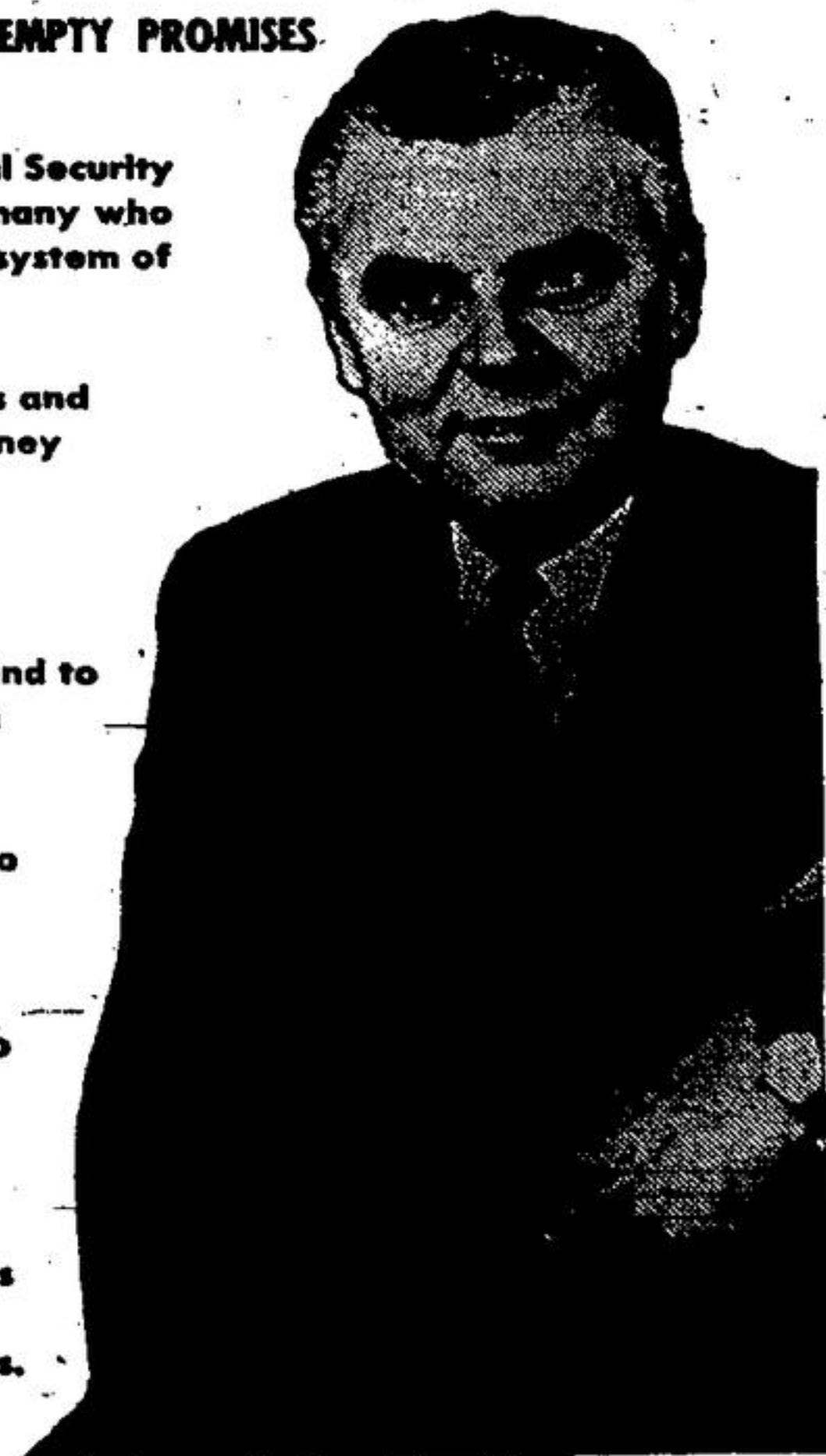
