

Oliver, leader of the Opposition and Liberal member for Grey South, said in his closing address on the Budget, that in hi opinion, if Mr. Diefenbaker and his Government are returned by the election on March 31 it would guarantee the return of the Frost government in the Province of Ontario, whenever the election may be called. This is the first time since I have been a member of the Ontario government that the leader of the opposition ever made a statement of this kind.
