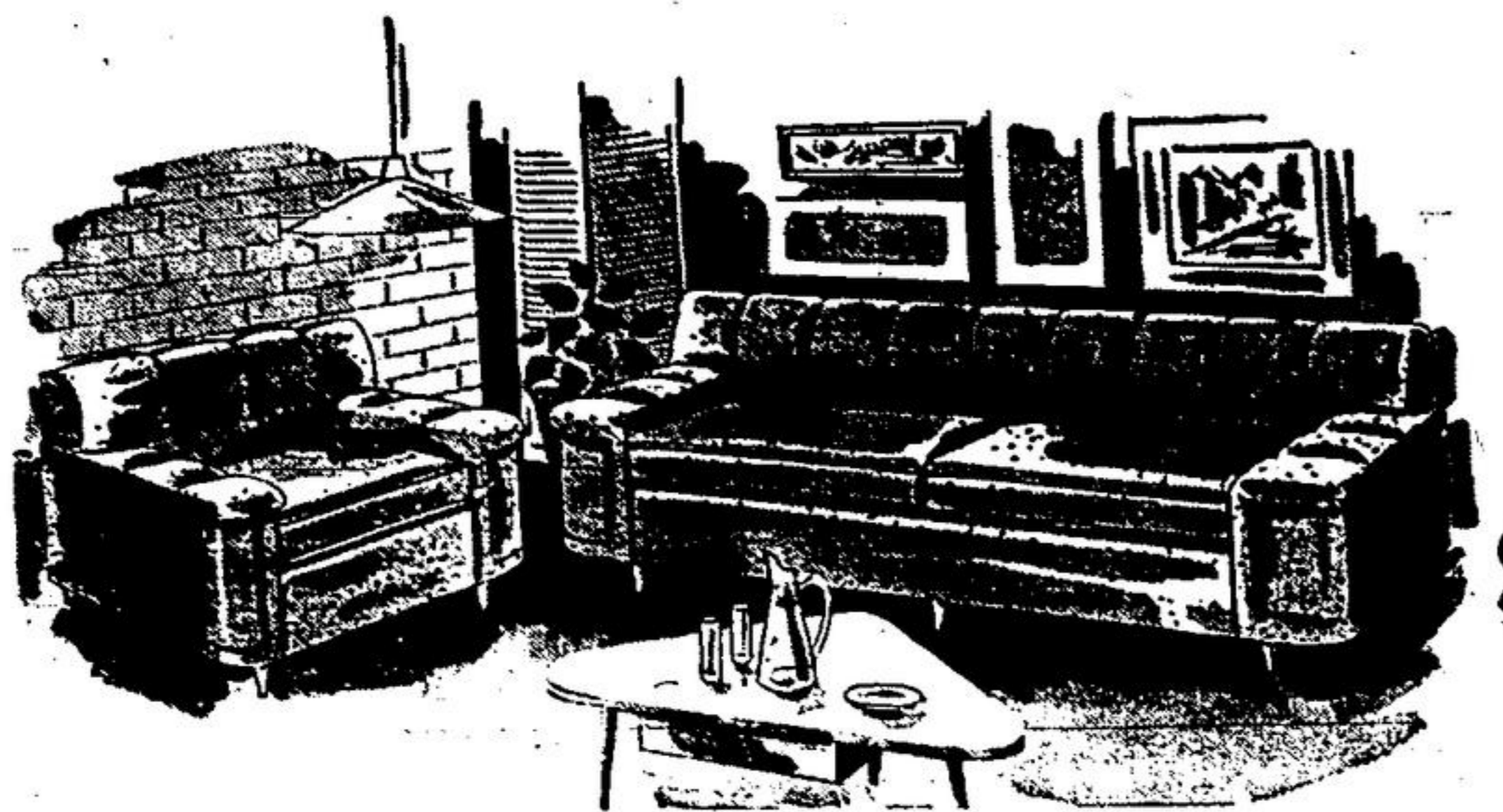

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## Queen's Pk. Report

The business of your Assembly started this week by passing a Bill that changed the tax on fuel oil. This change was made on the recommendation of a Committee set up by the Government at the last Session of your Assembly, to study the tax on gasoline and fuel oil. The Committee recommended that the tax on gasoline be left at 13 cents per gallon and the tax on fuel oil be 18½ cents. This was accepted by the Government and the bill was passed.

The estimates of the Dept. of Municipal Affairs were presented by the Minister, the Hon. William Warrender. I would like to make reference to two items in these estimates. The Department will pay in grants to mining municipalities the sum of \$3,500,000, and to other municipalities through the Unconditional Grants Act, \$21,600,000. These are huge sums of money, but they certainly represent the great development of the Province of Ontario.

Mr. Herbert, Conservative member for Temiskaming, paid tribute to the Dept. of Agriculture for the effort they had made to the development of better livestock in the District of Temiskaming and also that the grants of the Department of Agriculture have contributed greatly to the drainage and clearing of the land in the District of Temiskaming.

March 25th, the Labour Relations Committee, set up by the Government at the last Session to study Labour Relations between employer and employee, begged leave to continue their investigation into this year. The chairman James Maloney, Conservative member, Renfrew South, moved an interim report.

Hon. George Dunbar, Provincial Secretary, in presenting the report of his department, paid tribute to R. J. Cudney, Deputy Provincial Secretary for his long years of honourable service in the Government. Mr. Cudney started as an employee of the Government when he was quite a young boy. Mr. Dunbar also stated that there are seven thousand women employed in the Civil Service of the province.

George Wardrobe, Progressive Conservative member for Port Arthur, making an address on the Budget which brought the debate by the Government to a close, made these remarks. In his opinion Mr. Donald MacDonald, leader of the CCF, should be a private member, not the leader of a political party for in Mr. Wardrobe's opinion, a leader of a political party should have abilities that Mr. Wardrobe does not consider Mr. MacDonald is endowed with.

Hon. F. R. Oliver, leader of the Opposition and Liberal member for Grey South, said in his closing address on the Budget, that in his opinion, if Mr. Diefenbaker and his Government are returned by the election on March 31 it would guarantee the return of the Frost government in the Province of Ontario, whenever the election may be called. This is the first time since I have been a member of the Ontario government that the leader of the opposition ever made a statement of this kind.

Hon. Dr. Dymond, Minister of Reform Institutions, made the statement in his address on the Budget, that no man or country can remain great if they just hang their faith on the glories of the past. You must have faith in the future if this great province of Ontario is to fill the position that it should, in this great grouping

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of Provinces that make up the Dominion of Canada.

The motion on the vote on the Budget moved by the Hon. Leslie Frost, prime minister, "that the speaker do now leave the chair and that the House resolve itself into the Committee of Supply."

The following amendment was moved by Mr. Wintermeyer and seconded by Mr. Oliver.

"But this House regrets that the Budget does not in any way recognize or solve the fundamental fiscal problems of the Province of Ontario in its rapid evolution from an agricultural to an industrial economy and in particular, lacks imaginative leadership in the solution thereof."

The Prime Minister's motion was upheld by a vote of 12-73.

On Thursday, March 27th at 12.15 p.m. the Hon. J. Keiller Mackay, D.S.O., V.D., L.L.D. Lieutenant-governor of the Province of Ontario, prorogued the fourth Session of the 25th Parliament of Ontario.

Ladies and gentlemen, I would like to take this opportunity of making my personal reference to this Session of your Ontario Government. There was a lot of good legislation passed, but I consider the Bill that set up the Hospital Services Act, will long be remembered in the history of the Province of Ontario.

Goodbye for the present and hoping that it will be my privilege in the future to bring to you matters of public interest to the citizens of Halton.
