FORT ERIE OUSTS JUNIORS IN SATURDAY NIGHT GAME

When the Georgetown Junior Raiders fell off the deep end Saturday night they pulled half of the Fort Erie fans with them. The crowd, an estimated 650

paid, of which no more than a dozen claimed the J.R.s, was almost split down the middle by the start of the final period after watching the green and white clad underdogs completely bottle up the home crew for forty minutes with determined heads up hockey that came within a period of forcing a fifth game. It was 4-4 at the end of the second period but there was no question about Fort Erie having the bench strength and that's what made the difference in the third. Georgetown went the distance with just ten players. Saturday's see-saw struggle was a far cry from the Thursday night shellacking when the J.R.s took it on the chin for their 3rd straight loss, 13 to 4 the final score.

Fort Erie's four straight wins carry them to the Ontario Jr. C. final against Marcel Tessier and company of Newmarket.

Everybody had a hand in digging the J.R.s grave Thursday night. McGuire turned the first goal at 3:26 on a pass from Potyak. Potyak from McMahon at 12.18. Driver unassisted at 16.24, and then a pair by Norm Rouse the first from Monteroni and McGuire at 17.04 and the second from Elliott and McGuire just 21 seconds later had the locals groggy after just twenty minutes. Riddall from Richardson and Hyde at 6.05 and Baxter from Richardson at 13.22 found their range for the J.R.s.

Georgetown made no noise in the second frame as Fort Erie led their margin to 9 to 2 on goals by Potyak from McGuire at 7.55, Hutton from Potyak at 13.06, and Dube from Driver and Ehrmann at 15.42.

Fort Erie duplicated their five goal first period stint in the last session to run up an 11 goal lead before Georgetown answered with two tallies in the dying minutes of the game. Wiggins led the attack with two goals backed up by singles by Elliott, Ehrmann and McMahon.

Riddall counted his second of the night from Bob McKay at 18.18 and with Potyak sitting out a slashing penalty, Hyde let another one of his knee-high slap shots go that got by Zimmerman on his stick at 19.37. Ron McLean got the assist.

Two more names were added to the fast growing casualty list which reads like an all-star lineup. Jewell was knocked cold early in the game when he blocked Harry Elliott's drive with his head. He finished the period but Lockhurst went in goal for the second and third. Cox had to leave the game in the third stanza after being hit by a shot by Potyak that struck a blood vessel in his leg.

The shots were 51 by Fort Erie, 31 by Georgetown. Despite the top-sided scoring the J.R.s outshot the Fort in the final period 16 to 13.

The way the J.R.s almost pulled the rug from under the favourites Saturday night drew praise from a large portion of the crowd and before it was all over many of the fans found themselves in the strange position of backing the scrappy visitors.

Georgetown held the lead three times in the game. Paul Ward beat Mulholland with the first shot on goal at the 2:55 mark after taking McLean's pass. Hyde was also in on that one which stood up until midway through the period when white short handed, Fort Erie tied it, McGuire the marksman from Elliott and Norm Rouse.

Baxter who has displayed some of his best hockey since Georgetown entered the Fort Erie series, regained the lead for the Jr. Raiders at 13.32. Riddall sent Baxter into the clear with his pass at centre ice and the Beaver made no mistakes. McMahon capped a dangerous rush with the equalizer just three minutes later with McGuire and Rouse assisting, and it was 2-1 at the end of the period.

Georgetown matched the Fort goal for goal in the middle session but never did get back on top until the early stages of the third and then it only lasted for 6 seconds. Marshall got the gate for clipping before a minute had gone by in the second stanza and was still off when Hutton took McGuire's pass and picked a corner at a minute and 17 seconds to make it 3 to 2. Hyde who led the point getters with three picked up his second assist when he set Riddall up at the 3:26 mark. A pair of breakaways moved both clubs up a notch before the period was over. The teams were five a side when McGuire saw daylight and romped in to score from Rouse at 6.15 and were at full strength when Bob McKay left his pursuers far behind with a burst of speed that resulted in Georgetown's fourth tally. McLean got the assist on the goal which came at 8.20.

Baxter was the marksman as Georgetown wrestled the lead away from the Fort at the 5.43 mark in the third period from McKay and Hyde but at 5.49 Hutton wiped out the difference with his second tally of the night from Mike McGuire.

Hutton was also in on the winner which came off the stick of Mickey McMahon at 7 minutes even. Hales was also given an assist. The insurance goal was the picture play of the game as Gill Pilote carried the length of the ice to beat Lockhurst at 11.16.
