Businesswomen Hear Radio, TV Commentator

Mrs. Charles Wray, Mrs. Robert Wicks, Miss Lena McNally and Miss Marion Robinson, members of the Georgetown Business and Professional Women's Club attended the International Night banquet held in the Royal York Hotel on March 22nd. This banquet, sponsored by the seven Toronto clubs had as guest speaker Miss Vera Brittain, famous author, radio and TV commentator.

Miss Brittain told her audience women have a responsibility to

themselves, their homes, their communities and the future of the community. "We must teach our daughters to accept the responsibility for greater things to come for women."

Local government was one of the first fields in which women made headway, she said, commenting that despite this there is a "large residue of women apathetic to politics and ignorant of the issues in a general election. The small domestic jobs of running a home act as an anaesthetic on the mind of woman and she must rise above it." A few women like Ellen Fairclough and Charlotte Whitton will always get to the top but many women are needed on local coun-

cils and the lower levels of government and not just women that will decorate the council chambers with their new spring hats—women who are set to work at the business of government.

Today, she said, hardly a door is closed to energetic women in any field anywhere in the world, except perhaps the backward countries of Asia and India, and even these have fine examples of women working in the international field. "Those of us who are free are responsible for those who haven't independence. At the beginning of this movement women tended to be anti-man and yet man-imitating. Modern women are learning to accept equality and not identity."

OLD HIGH SCHOOL IS SLATED TO BE RAZED

A Georgetown historical landmark will disappear this summer when the old high school is demolished to make way for a new 12-room wing on the building.

Last week North Halton high school board engaged Barnett & Rieder, the firm of architects which designed the first new school wing, to design the new structure. The board plans a parking lot and a new football field with a cinder track field encircling it.

Planning for the day when the Dept. of Education will restore grants for gymnasiums, the board also decided to seek department approval for a double gymnasium for the school. The board will now be in a position to move quickly, should a change in grant regulations be made.

At the same meeting, a new 12-room Milton school received approval.

Mormon Missionaries Visiting Local Homes

The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter Day Saints, better known by the nickname "Mormons" has currently two of their young ministers in Georgetown calling at homes to explain their message. The two young men, Warren Kettle of Salt Lake City, Utah and Larry Benson of Preston, Idaho, are ordained ministers in the church acting in the capacity of missionaries and are addressed as "Elders".

The church derives the name, Mormon, from the record of scripture The Book of Mormon and it will be the purpose of these Elders to explain to a greater degree what the Book of Mormon is and where it came from.

The Mormon church was organized in the state of New York on April 6th, 1830, under the direction of the prophet Joseph Smith. The headquarters of the church today is located in Salt Lake City, Utah.
