In 1954, the mayor said. he found no one not in favour of the Delrex agreement. , The firm has since been most fair with the town, he said, and in no case where council has solicited help have they turned it down. In 1956, concerned with the tax rate, Delrex had been approached and had made a \$39,000 gift.

"We could sft all night and debate whether annexation was a wise move or not, though I personally think it was" said the mayor, "and we'd be no farther ahead because only time will prove it one way or the other. One thing I'm sure of, the town and Delrex have chosen to become partners, and a partnership is successful only if there is cooperation on both sides."

Disputing a statement of the mayor, Cr. Hyde said he was not pointing a finger at new residents, but at the man who said he would give Georgetown industry. Taxes are four or five times higher than they were in 1947, he said. Industrial land was available at a price in 1954 just as it is today, he said. (This was refuted by the mayor and Reeve Sargent who said they had visited the land owner on behalf of Ontario Steel Products which later located in Milton and had been told the land was not for sale.)

"You say no one opposed annexation. I was a town employee then, and I did" said Cr. Hyde. "I said the town could get better without getting bigger."

Cr. McGilvray said he had been told by Mr. Marsland of the Harley-Kay firm which later moved to Kitchener, that they would have Car equipped with Dual Controls built their new plant on the land being discussed, but could not buy it.
