Raiders Win And Lose Napane Series Is Even

The Raiders struck back in defence of their Intermediate A title Friday night when they dumped the fast skating Napane club by a 4 to 1 count to even their best of seven Ontario championship series at one game apiece, with the 3rd clash coming up here tonight.

Georgetown had to come from behind to get the win as Napane notched the opener midway thru the first period. Raiders tied it before the end of the period, added two more in the second, and then sewed it up with another goal late in the third.

Some sharp Napane netminding robbed the Raiders of claiming an even wider margin, and, though he didn't have to work as hard, Ross Howe proved just as able in guarding the local twine. Howe, who is the regular Bowmanville - Orono Combines goalie, was called on to replace Fred Lawrence who may be out for the rest of the finals with cracked ribs. A native of Oshawa, Howe was the sub-goalie for the Whitby Dunlops until they acquired Roy Edwards.

Gilmour made it 1-0 for Napane after 13 minutes and 17 seconds had gone by but at the 17:26 mark with Landy sitting out an interference penalty Frank Ptashnik rifled a high sizzler from 25 feet out that caught the upper right hand corner to tie it up.

A crowd of about 850 looked on as Raiders leaped into a 2 to 1 lead at 1:17 of the second period. Ron Dixon the marksman unassisted. McKeegan of Napane was off when Ptashnik got his second of the night from Junior Beaumont and Dave Irons on a power play at 11:42. The Raiders again had the odd man when they netted the clincher at 17:14 of the finale, Dixon scoring his second on a pass from Vary.

Sharing the spotlight with Dixon and Ptashnik were Blake Inglis and Leapin' Lou Fawcett who turned in his best game of the season in heading a solid Raider defence. The penalties were even, each club drawing eight.

It was no contest in Napane when the teams opened the series there last Wednesday night as the Raiders crumbled under the Nap-

ane machine still sharp after the hard fought series against the Bowmanville - Orono Combines, while the Raiders appeared listless after easily mauling the Windsor Riversides in a series that went just three games.

Napane scored three times in the first period, 8 times in the second and added 3 more in the third session in piling up the 12-5 victory.

Goals by Gilmour, White, Griffin made it 3-0 at the end of the first frame. White tallied again before Bud Vary found the range for the Raiders and then the roof fell in as Napane rapped home 4 goals in a minute and 13 seconds. Gerew, Griffin, Landy and Gerew again blinking the light between 10:03 and 11:16 of the second period. Irons and Gilmour exchanged tallies before the end of the frame.

The scoring was even in the 3rd period, each team scoring three times. McKeegan, Gerew and McAllister for Napane and Bingham, Blake Inglis and Irons for the Raiders, McLaughan was in the Georgetown net. There were 14 penalties in the game, the Raiders drawing 8 of them.

The 4th game is in Napane on Saturday with the 5th one back here on Monday, April 21st. If a sixth game is needed it will be played at Napane on Wednesday, April 23rd and if it goes the route the 7th game will be here on Saturday, April 26th.

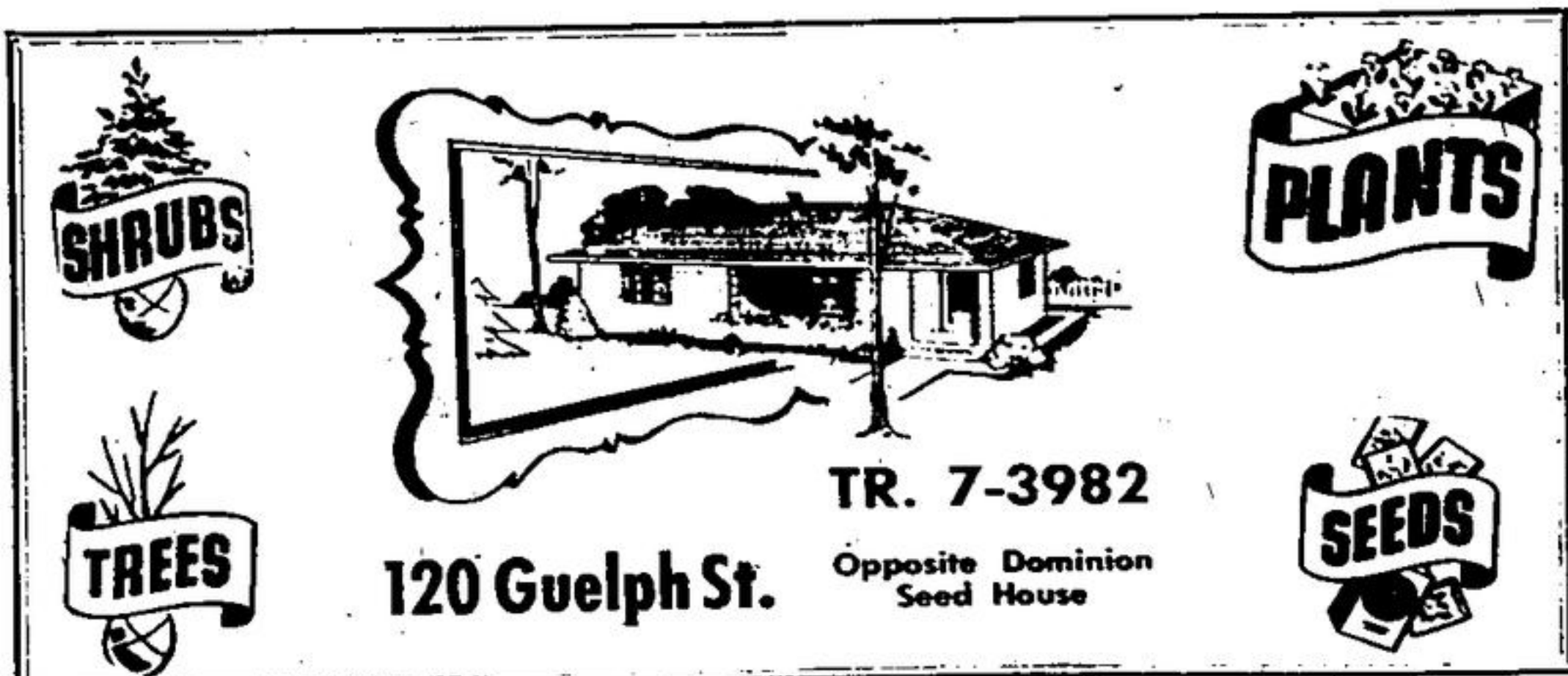
