Rotarians Play Active Part In Georgetown Community Life

Indicative of the growth of the town, is the fact that only three short years ago, there was but one service club here. Now, along with the tremendous growth of Georgetown, it is found that beside Georgetown's first and by far the oldest club, the Lions, there are two newer clubs, The Rotary Club and the Kinsmen, which was newly formed with a charter night in Guelph some weeks ago.

The subject of this item, the Georgetown Rotary Club, was formed some three years ago, and their charter night was held on March 7th, with over two hundred present in the Legion Hall on Mill Street.

Since that time the club has had a solid record of achievement and membership, while still fairly small, has held its own, and recently has shown a steady growth. Privately, Rotary members approve this, feeling quite happy to operate with their group of enthusiastic members, and let those interested seek to join the club, rather than have a membership drive to obtain new members. "Better to have thirty enthusiastic members whose attendance is regular and who take an active interest, rather than open up the club to those who are not vitally interested in Rotary and its work," opines one past president.

The charter president of the group was John Gunn, a chemical engineer at Provincial Paper, also active in many other groups, and this year a councillor. 1956-57 prexy was Dick Shearly, an aeronautical engineer at Malton, who resides in town. The current year sees Bill Carr, head of the local surveying firm as president, with W. B. 'Bill' Hamilton newly elected as prexy for the coming year, '58-'59. He takes over as head of Rotary in June.

Bill is head of his own firm of W. B. Hamilton Construction and is active in many local groups. Other officers for the coming year include vice president, Ralph Ursel, secretary Ken Nash, treasurer, Walter Pope and two directors, Bill MacCormack and Robert Barber. The sergeant at arms is Jim Ritchie.

Committees are divided so that each member has a job, and in many cases heads a committee. Designed to keep each member actively interested, there are enough jobs to keep each member busy, and feeling they are making a worthwhile contribution to their club, as indeed they do.

Principal interest (although the group has many others) is the fact that Rotary is synonymous with the Easter Seal campaign for the Crippled Children. This takes a large share of proceeds from club activities, although the amount of money given to other worthy causes in the town borders on the unbelievable for so small a group. As much as possible Rotary policy has been to keep away from selling draw tickets and to concentrate on providing entertainment or something a bit unusual to raise their funds. Best example is of course, their fabulously successful annual minstrel show, their yearly auction sale and last year, their first turkey shoot. The only direct appeal for funds is by the mailing of Easter Seals to town and district citizens.

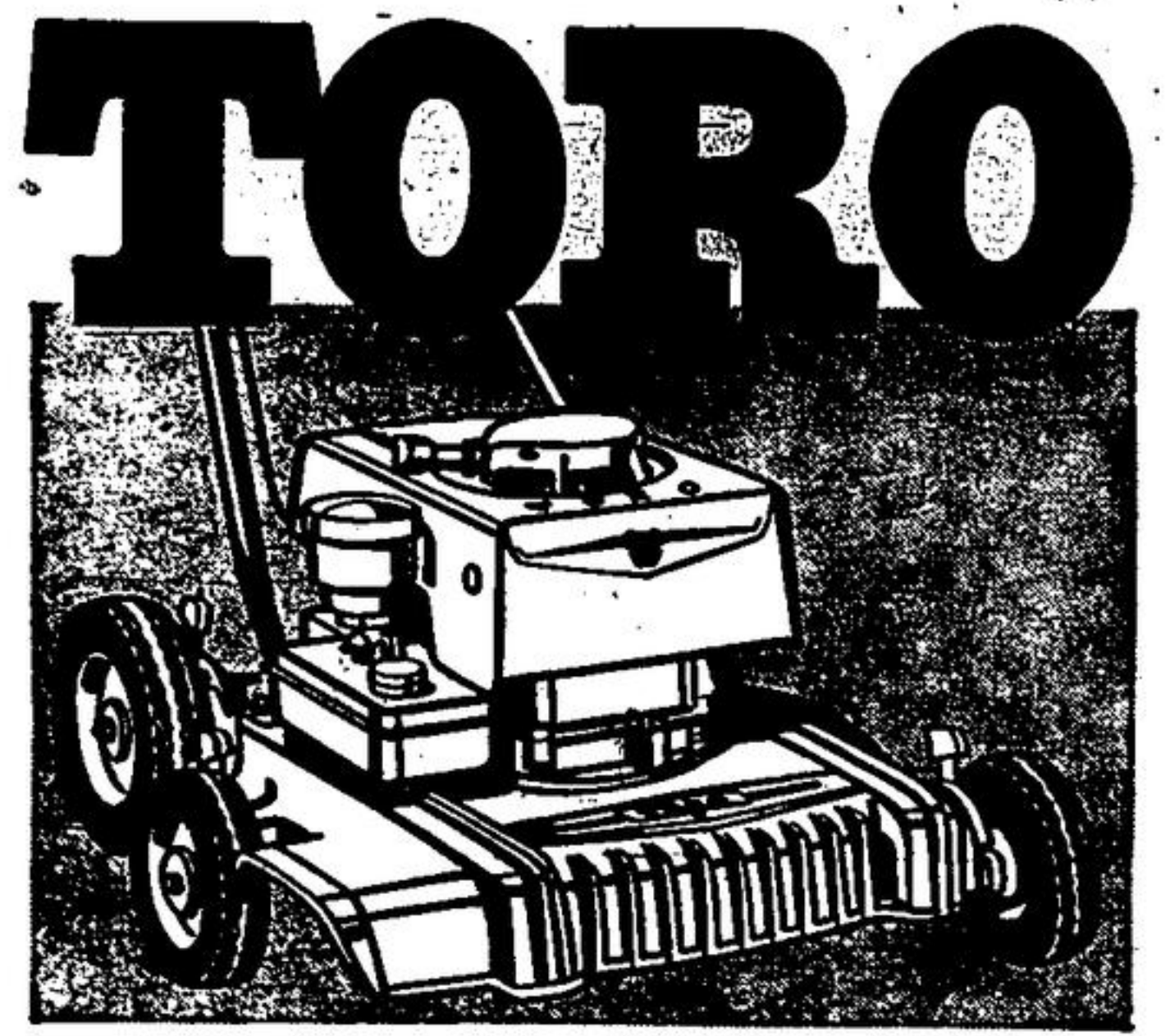
