Quarter Mill Increase In Halton County Rate

Halton County council increased its tax rate one-quarter of a mill Tuesday when the budget for 1958 expenditures totalling \$794,056.36 was set. This year's 5.75 mill rate — 3.25 mills for general rate and 2.5 for road system expenditures — is based on the 1957 equalized assessment of \$138,096,758.

The rate has been 5.5 for the past two years.

The general rate of 3.25 mills will raise money for an estimated \$448,881.48. Largest expenditure in this figure is the charity and welfare, totalling \$327,246.76. Other expenses expected are:

Enlarge, Remodel Wigo Main Street TV Store

A clean dry basement was constructed under the new section providing an additional 600 sq. ft. of storage space.

The new store offers the customers a wider selection of electric ranges, Hi-Fi sets, tape recorders and household appliances as well as five name lines of television sets in every style and model. A modern record bar catering to all tastes in LPs, 45s and standard size records is located at the rear of the store.
