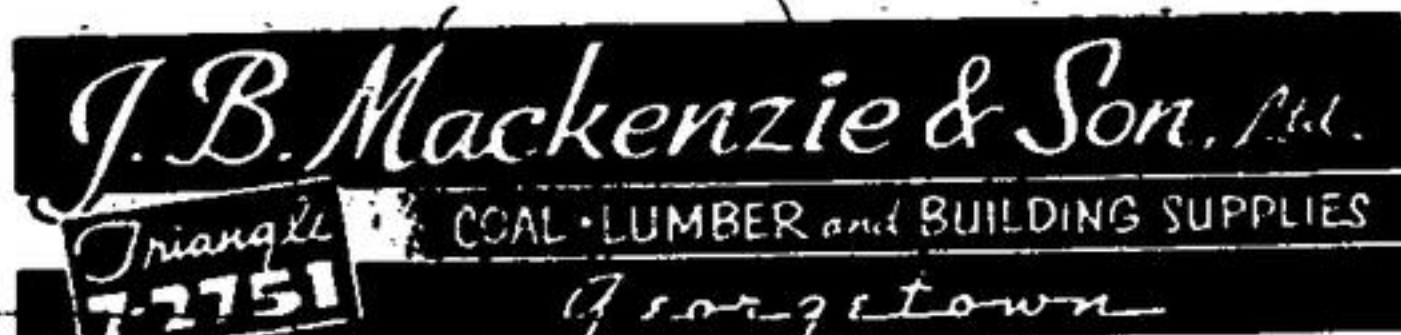

**Claims Taxes Higher Since Delrex Came**

April 23, 1958

The Editor:

May I through the medium of your letter box column voice my protest to the proposed building of 582 more houses by Delrex.

My reason is this. Since Delrex started to build here in Georgetown, our taxes have risen in two years from 1955 to 1957 by 136.33.

I well recall the advent of Delrex and how the whole town was agog with the news of fabulous prices paid for farms and how it was going to boost our town and benefit us all. Great stress was placed upon the new industries and how it would provide work for us all. But, what has been the result, no industries, no work, and in many cases the doubling of taxes. It has meant two new schools, more water and sewer facilities. Police, Hydr., to say nothing of roads and the upkeep there-of.

We had sold some property in Toronto in order to take a long overdue holiday. When we returned four months later, we soon learned that we were among the many others that would help pay for Georgetown's Delrex.

As a taxpayer for forty years I have never seen an increase in our taxes to compare with what has happened since Delrex came to town. When I complained about the rise in taxes to our Mayor he asked me how many children were in our apartments. I told him about twelve. He then explained that it cost money to educate these children, new schools and teachers etc. Does our worthy mayor now forget these things? And that if another 582 homes are built it will probably mean that there will be another one thousand to fifteen hundred more children in those homes that will need more schools, more water, sewers, etc.

I believe someone said that there was resentment against a man that has money. (meaning Delrex). To the contrary, some of our townsmen seem to find him so popular that they would readily hand over all our assets together with our bank books if we have any, and keep us tied down for the rest of our lives trying to pay for privileges extended to him.

Councillors Hyde, Harrison and Elliott should be commended for their stand against something that they are NOT SO SURE is for the good of the town they represent.

I have heard the expression that Georgetown has been sold down the river more than once. We all make mistakes, Georgetown must grow, but let us make sure that in growing we do not grow too big for our pants and find ourselves in bankruptcy.

The taxpayers have the right to expect their money to be spent with caution. If it is not able to put a few repairs on sidewalks, etc. because of expenditures on schools etc., etc. for Delrex, then it's time that a halt was called on those expenditures.

Many of us have wondered what the fatal fascination of Delrex is upon our Council, so that they are blinded against making decisions with caution, and want to rush business against the wishes of the people they claim to represent. If our council can say NO to any small repairs such as sidewalks, etc., then they have no right to Yes. Yes the expenditure of many thousands of the taxpayers dollars in order to please Any man.

With no industries here, what would happen if half the townsmen were out of work? We have unemployment, yes, but how much does unemployment cover, not very much.

A vote on this question is the only way to settle it.
