At Mr. Fussell's Metalcraft studio the party were greeted by one of their own members, Mrs. Wes. Beatty of Acton, who was werking on some attractive silver candlesticks.

After an interesting morning at these various studios, the party had luncheon at the home of Mrs. Hans Lundberg, where her lovely weaving was of special interest to the weavers of the group. Mrs. George Steel had on display at Mrs. Lundberg's her well-known collection of semi-precious stones, some in natural quartz form, but most of them beautifully cut and polished by herself, ready for setting, and many of which were of Canadian origin.


