Listings Increase 300 In New Telephone Book

The Georgetown post office has recently dispensed 3,300 copies of a new telephone directory. Circulation figures for Georgetown show an increase of 300 over last year, because of the continuing growth of the town, says L. G. Denby, Bell Telephone manager for this vicinity.

This year's directory, which includes listings for Brampton, Orangeville, Milton and a number of smaller communities, will have a total distribution of 18,568 as compared with 14,075 in 1957. The cover has a new look, featuring a sketch of Peel County court house in Brampton and replacing last year's design showing a scene on the Credit river. The revised introductory pages include the latest information about telephone service.

Pages 4 and 5 explain Direct Distance dialing, and how to use this new service which goes into effect on May 25th in Georgetown, Brampton, Milton and most of the Toronto area. It will enable subscribers to dial many of their station-to-station calls themselves.
