Expect New Ambulance To Arrive Next Week

Health Minister Speaker TB Association Dinner

The fact that tuberculosis is still a serious problem was stressed by representatives of sanatoria, a doctor from the Ontario Department of Health and the guest speaker, the Ontario Minister of Health at the annual meeting of the Halton County Tuberculosis and Health Association. Their concern was expressed to about 150 guests at the dinner meeting in Trafalgar Hall.

The Christmas seal campaign was the most successful in history with \$23,268.31 received, the annual financial report indicated. This financed the mass survey in the county, the case finding program, social services and rehabilitation, a grant to the Mountain Sanatorium and the Ontario Tuberculosis Association.

The president, Elmer C. Foster of R. R. 3, Campbellville presided for the program. In his report he said, "The Christmas Seal sale serves a two-fold purpose. It raises the necessary funds to carry on the work and also reminds the public about tuberculosis."

Mrs. M. E. Lunau of Oakville, the executive secretary, said, "The association carried on its policy of assuming responsibility for clinical chest x-rays for the residents of Halton county at a cost of \$4,790.44." She explained that the seal campaign's per capita return was 34 cents — the highest in Canada. Returns per letter sent out were \$1.22 and per contributor \$3.09, which is above the provincial average. She expressed thanks to all the people of the county.

Chairman of the case finding committee, Dr. A. F. Bull, M. D., M.O.H., of Milton, reported that 20,927 chest x-rays were done in the 1957 survey. Of this number, 18 showed evidence of pulmonary tuberculosis, and four of these had active disease requiring treatment.

Travelling chest clinics are now being held in Milton, Acton, Georgetown and Burlington. Patients in Oakville, Bronte and Trafalgar attend hospital clinics.

The social worker, Mrs. G. P. McAleer, reported visits to patients at home and in sanatoria.

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TELLS HOME & SCHOOL OF HORTICULTURE WORK

Representing the Georgetown Horticultural Society, Edmund Faris spoke to the regular meeting of the Harrison Home and School Association on Monday, May 5th, informing the members of the work done by the society in aiding its junior counterpart and briefly outlining the plans for the coming year.

In his talk Mr. Faris touched on a proposed competition for the Junior Society to be held once a month with points allotted the winners, the points to be totalled at the end of the year and prizes awarded. The prizes would be presented for nature study and horticulture.

On the subject of tree planting on town streets it was agreed that trees not exceeding 25' would be used, preferably those with a small root system. Suggested trees included Flowering Crab, Mountain Ash, Purple Leaf Plum, Japanese Cherry and Eastern Red-bush.

The landscaping plan drawn up for Harrison Public School by Principal Harold Henry was studied with the Horticultural Society assisting by suggesting the shrubs, plants, etc. suitable for the plan. The tree planting was done last Saturday with the help of Harrison grade eight students.

Also at the meeting were three vocal groups from the school which had competed at the recent Halton Music Festival, the triple trio, triple duet and a boys choral group for changed voices. Mr. Henry pointed out that the Harrison singers had all received not less than 80 points from the adjudicator. The trophies won were on display in the show case in the entrance hall.

At the conclusion of the meeting sandwiches and coffee were served by Mrs. John Essdale.



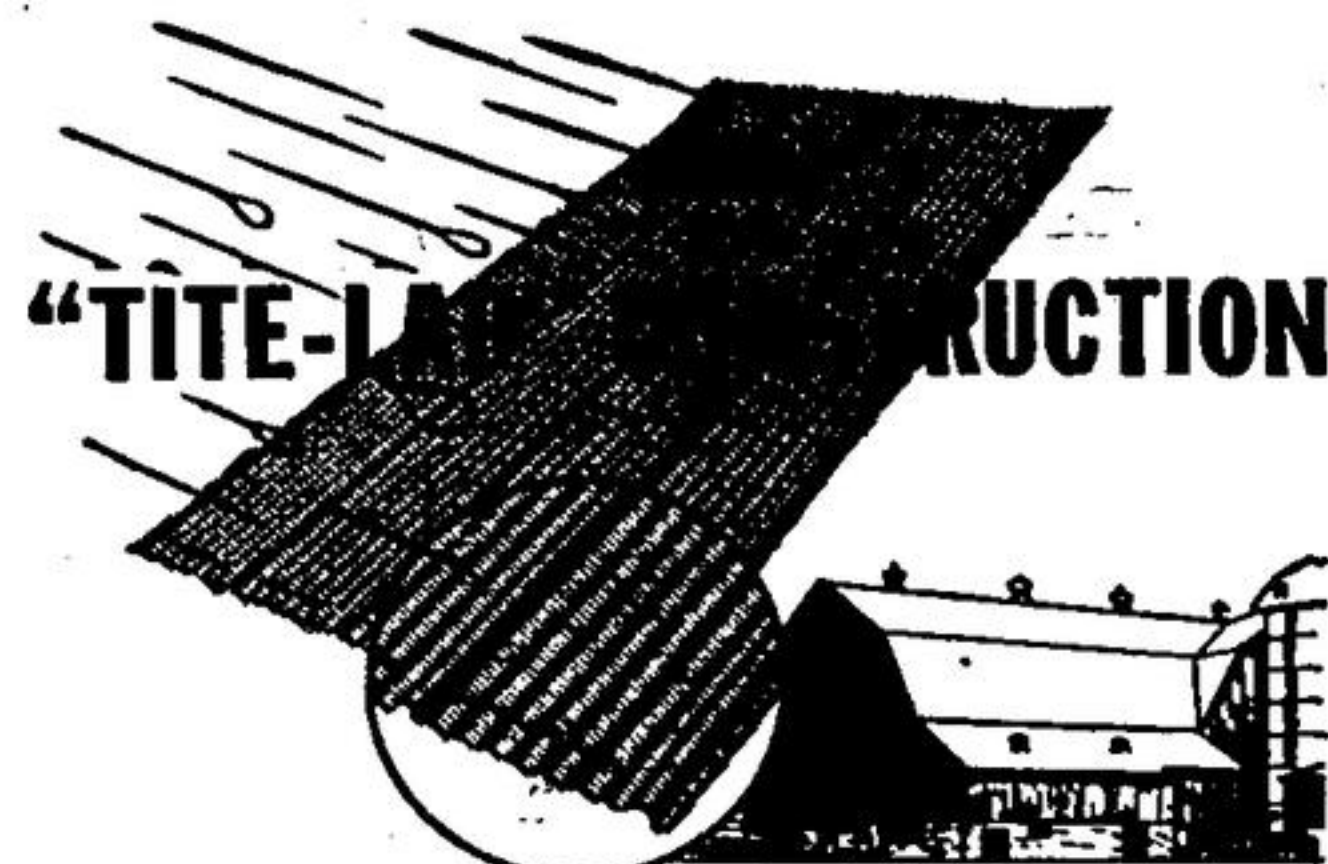
RURAL DEAN
