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**Manor Board Planning  
Double Accommodation**

Tentative plans for an expansion program which will almost double the bed capacity of Halton Centennial Manor in Milton were announced this week by the Manor board and superintendent Stan Allen.

Primary ideas on expanding the Manor from the present 105 beds to 200 beds are being discussed with the Department of Welfare and the board hopes to meet with the architect this week to finalize drawings, financing and construction.

The present plan being discussed includes, additions to all wings of the Manor, including men's and women's normal care wings, the special care wing and the infirmary section. According to the superintendent, the present heating system should be adequate for the increased size of the building and an addition of small kitchen facilities between the infirmary

and special care wings should handle the increased need there.

Mr. Allen declared statements in a Hamilton newspaper that it will take three years to accommodate the Manor's waiting list of elderly people. "We've got a waiting list but we've always kept up with it," he said.

He said overcrowding at present is confined to four women using a room usually shared by two couples, because of lack of sufficient accommodation in the women's wing.

The Board will submit its recommendations on expansion to County Council for final approval.

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**Darwin Tost  
Jr. Woodstock  
Track Champ**

A Georgetown High School student until some months ago when his parents moved to Ingersoll, Darwin Tost, was crowned junior track and field champion of Woodstock Collegiate last week. His three firsts in the 100 yard dash, broad jump and high jump were enough to win him the championship.

His time for the 110 yards was 11.6, he won the broad jump with 15' 2" and the high jump with 4' 5". He was also instrumental in Woodstock Collegiate's win over their rivals, Huron Park Secondary School, winning the high and broad jumps for WCI and placing third in the 100-yard dash with an even faster time of 11.2 seconds.

On his showing he was advanced to the tri-county meet at the University of Western Ontario at London yesterday, was presented with an athletic trophy and will have his name engraved on a plaque at his school.

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
