The bathing beach, says Mr. Sauriol, has been doubled in size and is ideal for swimmers — experienced or beginners. The fleet of small pleasure craft has also been increased, so that picnickers can admire the full beauty of this unspoiled lake from every angle.

A photographic contest will be launched this year by MTRCA to encourage visitors to Heart Lake and the other conservation areas, who wish to have their own permanent record of these nature trails and fishing and boating resorts. Camera enthusiasts, whether black-and-white or colour experts, will have an opportunity of competing for prizes, and the camera clubs are being advised on the contest conditions.

The MTRCA is always eager to see that every person interested in Conservation is able to learn of the areas available, as well as of the educational facilities for old and young that are fostered by MTRCA and other conservation groups.

The Authority says Mr. Sauriol, is anxious that everyone interested will take time out to visit these areas, which are open "all day" during the summer season, every day of the week. The admission charge is 50 cents per automobile, irrespective of number of persons in it. Season passes for \$6.00 admit the visitor to any of the conservation areas anywhere throughout the whole season.

**URGE FARMERS TO TREAT YELLOW ROCKET**

Yellow Rocket in the past few years has spread across Halton County. By the time this appears in print its bright yellow flowers which resemble those of common Mustard, will be conspicuous in many fields. While it belongs to the mustard family, Yellow Rocket blooms two or three weeks earlier than Mustard. In addition Yellow Rocket has a multiple crown and often has a number of main roots, a smooth stem in contrast to Wild Mustard which has a hairy stem and more sharply-margined leaves.

Then too, Wild Mustard is an annual, while Yellow Rocket is a biennial or short lived perennial. Single plants and small patches should be pulled and burned. At the present time, however, the ground is so dry that most of the plants will break off. Although Yellow Rocket may be killed by the use of 12 to 16 ounces of 2, 4-D acid per acre — this will also kill clovers and alfalfa, so may be used on pure grass stands only. In meadows containing alfalfa or clovers, some folk are resorting to a knapsack sprayer and spraying the individual plants only. In such cases Medforth Pestwrest recommends a cupful of 64 oz. Brushkill in 3 gallons of water. Here in Halton we look on "Med" as Halton's authority on weed spraying. Certainly "Med's" many friends and

customers hope he will soon be fully recovered and able to resume his weed spraying service.

Ontario's Dairy Queen in 1958 will receive an all-expense tour to Great Britain by Pan American Airways according to an announcement just released by R. J. Jardine, chairman of the Ontario Selection Committee. **TRACTOR CHIEF CAUSE OF FARM ACCIDENTS**

One member of every fourth farm family will become an accident victim this year, if our accident rating continues as it has in the past. Nearly one-half of Ontario's annual farm accident deaths are caused by carelessness in handling farm machinery. Since the tractor is used frequently, its careless and improper use causes more accidents than any other single agent. Gasoline, pound for pound, has three times the explosive power of dynamite. Too much caution therefore, cannot be exercised in handling gasoline. Certainly anyone who refuels a tractor when the engine is running or hot is "looking for trouble." Detailed information on safety in tractor operation is contained in the Ontario Department of Agriculture Circular No. 170, which can be obtained at the Agricultural Office in Milton.

Announcement has been made of a shooting competition being held in the local armoury. The shoot will consist of teams comprised of district Legion branches as well as army teams. **BRUCELLOSIS INCIDENCE LOW IN PRINCE EDWARD**

Last week we reported on the progress of the Brucellosis eradication programme in Oxford county. The last report from that county states that 348 reactors have been found in the 1158 herds tested. Inasmuch as the total cattle population in these herds was 33,098 the percentage of reactors was 1.16. Reactors were found, however, in 13.8 per cent of the herds tested in Oxford. In the Prince Edward County, the only other county in Ontario where blood testing under the Brucellosis Control Area programme has been initiated to date, only .54 per cent of the 9085 cattle tested have reacted.

In a week's time we anticipate that we may have something more definite to report relative to when the test is likely to commence in Halton.
