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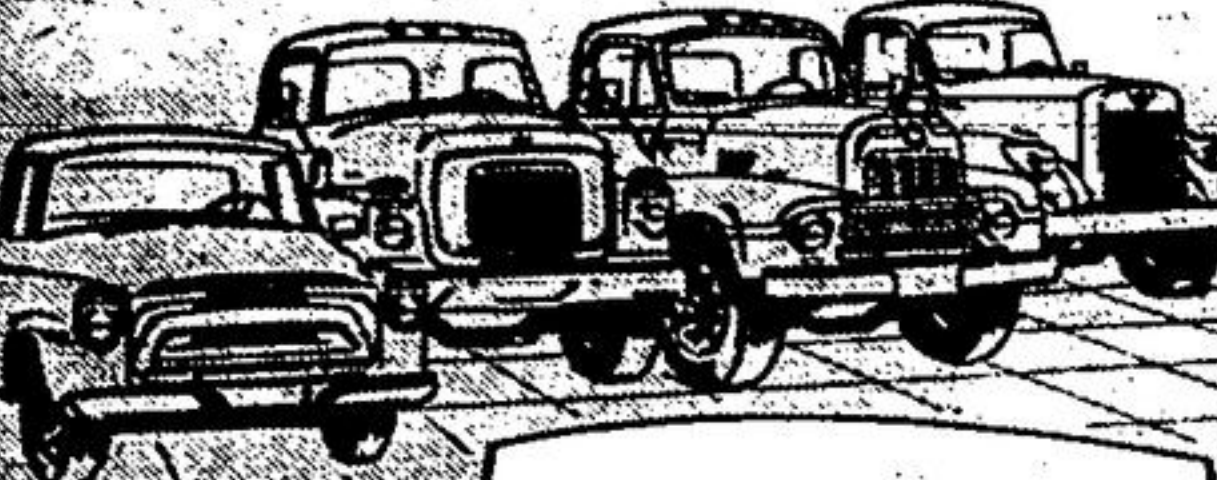
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CALEDON VETERINARIAN HONoured BY COLLEAGUES

A graduate of the Ontario Veterinary College, then in Toronto, in 1913, and a Veterinary Inspector with the Federal Government for the past 30 years, Dr. W. F. R. Stubbs, Caledon, was honoured at a presentation held in Brampton.

The presentation and farewell party was held at the home of Dr. James McCabe. Dr. Stubbs' retirement became effective May the first.

Following his graduation in 1913, Dr. Stubbs practiced for one year at Caledon before going west where he remained for a year as an inspector at one of the meat packing plants at Edmonton.

He then joined the armed forces and went overseas in March, 1916. He was attached to second division Sixth Artillery Brigade and held the rank of Captain conferred on him while on active service in France.

Dr. Stubbs returned home in May, 1919, and a public reception was held in his honour in the Caledon Town Hall. Following his discharge he practiced privately for nine years.

His father, Dr. William Stubbs, was one of the first veterinary inspectors for the province of Ontario.

Dr. Stubbs Jr. first received his appointment with the government in October, 1918, a position he has held until his retirement this year.

Veterinarians attended the presentation from as far east as Belleville, and west as London. Many were also present from Toronto and surrounding district, including Dr. Charles Sayers of Georgetown. A large representation of livestock breeders were present from Peel.

Dr. Glen Collicutt, head of the Toronto office, was master of ceremonies and spoke in warm terms of Dr. Stubbs' efficient service and splendid co-operation during his 30 years of service with the department. Speeches were also made by several of the veterinarians, and Dr. McCabe made the presentation of a leather travelling bag. Mrs. (Dr.) R. Twiss, Brampton presented Mrs. Stubbs with a bouquet of spring flowers.

Dr. Stubbs made a reply in appreciation of the gift and the splendid fellowship enjoyed by him over the years, and Mrs. Stubbs thanked those present for the flowers. Following the presentation a social evening was enjoyed by the guests.

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5 COUNTIES ART SHOW PLANNED FOR KITCHENER

A visit to the Five Counties Art Association Exhibition of paintings to be held in Kitchener, Victoria Park Pavilion on May 17th and 18th will be found well worth while by all who are interested in art. The pictures to be shown are those selected by the judges at recent art shows held in Cooksville, Hespeler and Shelburne by the Association. There will also be exhibits of weaving, pottery and puppets.

The education committee, under William R. Green of Oakville, distributes books and pamphlets and arranges for speakers.

Dr. MacKinnon Phillips, the provincial minister of health, informally addressed the group and, after appreciative laughter at several anecdotes, spoke seriously to the group. "No government can do without these volunteer organizations," he pointed out. "Your contribution is the foundation for basic Christianity."

Dr. Phillips was very concerned about a situation that will have to be coped with in the next five years. He referred to New Canadians who, with a change in climate and diet, might develop TB. He had been asked to agree to entry of immigrants with tuberculosis into the country. He explained his refusal, since, although the mentally ill are harmless, TB patients are potential killers.

He reviewed the insurance program to go into effect next year but said that, as far as he was concerned, there would never be state medicine here.

Bruce McNab gave the report of the nominating committee. All the present directors of the Association were renamed, with the addition of Frank Quinlan of Campbellville and Ewart Carberry of Oakville. The directors name their own officers. Other directors are E. C. Foster, president for the past year; Bruce McNab, past vice-president; Bruce Harrison, past honorary treasurer; Dr. A. F. Bull, Dr. G. K. Phillips, Oakville; Mrs. Mary S. Pettit, Milton; Mrs. E. Sanford, Limehouse; Mrs. George Sommerville, R. R. 2 Acton; Dr. W. L. Anderson, Oakville; Mel Howden, Burlington; H. C. Morris, Oakville; William Benson and William R. Green. Mrs. M. E. Lanau is the executive secretary and Mrs. G. P. McAleer the social worker.

Doctors present represented several sanatoria. They greeted the meeting, praised the work of the association and impressed upon the group that tuberculosis is still a serious problem.

Dr. Ewart, medical superintendent of the Mountain Sanatorium, said the san is admitting as many from Halton as it did 10 years ago, although of course the population is up. Incidence rate is going down very slowly, he said.

Tuberculosis is not a disease which has been conquered, said Dr. Wicks, medical superintendent of the Weston Sanatorium. The number of patients there has increased. The majority of patients are no longer young, but in the 40 to 50 age group.

Dr. McKenna conveyed greetings from the Freeport San.

"It is evident we have a long way to go," declared Dr. Holting of the Ontario Department of Health. "Organizations such as this have made progress possible."

Trevor Pierce of the Ontario Tuberculosis Association complimented the Halton group on the excellence of their progress and promised further assistance from the central office.

CANADIAN HOLSTEIN GRAND CHAMPION AT AUSTRALIA

For the second consecutive year Sniders Fond Hope King was named Grand Champion Holstein bull at the Royal Show held at Sydney, Australia. Previous to being purchased in 1955 for the New South Wales Department of Agriculture, King was one of the top show bulls in Canada.

He was named All-Canadian two-year-old bull in 1954 after being Grand Champion at Ottawa Winter Fair and Reserve Senior Champion at the Royal Winter Fair, Toronto. Then in 1955 he took the Grand Championship at the C. N. E. and was selected as the Reserve All-Canadian Aged Bull. King was bred by A. B. Snider, Brampton, and shown in Canada by J. M. Fraser, Streetsville, and Leslie Collins, Cobden.

It is interesting to note that J. M. Fraser, one of King's joint owners in Canada, was the judge at the recent Australian Royal Show. He reports that because of his interest in King he did not place him, but asked a visiting judge from Holland to do so. It was the latter who made King Grand Champion.

A total of 250 head were shown at the Australian Royal.
