### Ask Pedestrians Obey Traffic Duty Officer

Police chief Roy Haley has issued a warning aimed at those pedestrians who have consistently ignored the traffic officer on point duty at the intersection of Main and Hill Streets during the five o'clock rush on Fridays.

Chief Haley stresses that pedestrians should comply with the signals given by the officer on duty and should wait at the curb until motioned to proceed across the street. Persons crossing against the officer's signal are running the same risk as crossing against a red light on a Toronto street and as both motorists and pedestrians realize that the four corners at five o'clock simulate a city intersection.

Anyone not complying with the signals given by the officer on traffic duty this Friday may not be around next week to get another chance.
