Proponents of a full-time engineer for Georgetown, Crs. Fred Harrison and Alfred Sykes got no' support at council meeting Monday when for the second time in recent months, they moved to engage a man. Previously their motion suggested a salary of \$10,000, and on Monday an \$8,000 salary was indicated in the motion which, on a recorded vote, was

defeated 7 to 2. Both councillors explained that they had no dissatisfaction with work of Wm. H. Carr who has served Georgetown in a part-time capacity for a year. Cr. Harrison said Mr. Carr himself had told council recently that he did not feel he has the necessary time to operate his own business and serve the town also. Mayor Armstrong explained that since then Mr. Carr has himself engaged an assistant engineer and that he has changed his opinion and is in a position to continue in the town's employ.

Reeve Doug Sargent indicated he might favour a full-time man but did not agree with the salary

Others expressed agreement with Cr, Hyde who said the town has the services of an engineering staff at a reasonable fee and should continue as long as this situation exists. He reminded council that an engineer's salary is not the whole cost and that if a man is engaged he will need assistants.

"We're operating a million dollar business, and have a consultant instead of a man who is available at all times" was Cr. Sykes' opinion. "I don't know of any large business which operates
