Rosafe Holstein Dispersal Sale Brings Buyers from Wide Area

The meteoric story of Brampton's Rosafe Holstein herd, owned by Dr. Hector Astengo, came to an end Tuesday in Oakville when 125 head of purebred Holstein cattle went under the auctioneer's hammer.

Ten years ago Dr. Astengo came to Canada from Argentina, and purchased the farm and herd of the ABC Farms, established some six years earlier by Armstrong Bros. of Brampton. Rosafe is now, a decade later, internationally famous in Holstein circles.

"I came to Canada first in 1946 on a buying trip," says Dr. Astengo. "I purchased the farm and herd from Armstrongs in 1948, and since then have spent four or five months a year in Canada. I am going to be 63 in September, and it is time to retire."

Dr. Astengo says that even when he retires, he will still come to Canada every year as a "spectator" at Canadian Holstein shows. "I

have been most fortunate during my stay at Rosafe in having a most competent staff. Peter May, my farm manager, and my other employees have been most conscientious and have made it possible for me to operate Rosafe although I am only in the country four or five months a year."

Dr. Astengo plans to live in Buenos Aires when his farms and cattle are sold. He dispersed his Holstein herd at Oakville Tuesday, and will sell the 400-acre farm on Highway Seven later in the year. The prominent cattle-breeder owns 5,000 acres in Argentina, 5,000 acres on which more than 6,000 cattle roam. He is negotiating now for the sale of his Argentinian herd and property.

The Tuesday sale was one of the greatest ever held in Canada, rivaling the Mount Victoria dispersal sale of 1942 in its effect on the Holstein breed. So outstanding have been the families developed at Rosafe, and so widespread was interest in the 125 head sold, that buyers came from all parts of North and South American and from Europe.

The foundation for the Rosafe herd was laid by Elgin and Ted Armstrong, and by 1947 the herd was beginning to make its presence felt in the show ring. That year ABC Inka May was grand champion at the CNE. By the next fall, at the time of Dr. Astengo's purchase, she was well along with her senior four-year-old record of 1128 pounds fat from 24,141 pounds of milk which was second highest in Canada and is still third place in the class.

Since 1948 when he got off to a running start, Dr. Astengo's Holsteins rapidly became one of the top group of Canadian herds.

Animals from the Rosafe herd have won 24 All-Canadian and 18 Reserve All-Canadian awards also 12 All American awards. These have been won largely by the progeny of the famous Clall Extra sire, ABC Reflection Sovereign, whose get-of-sire has four times been named All-Canadian and All-American. Dr. Astengo has been five times Premier Breeder and Premier Exhibitor at the Royal Winter Fair, and twice winner of both these awards at the International Dairy Show, Chicago.

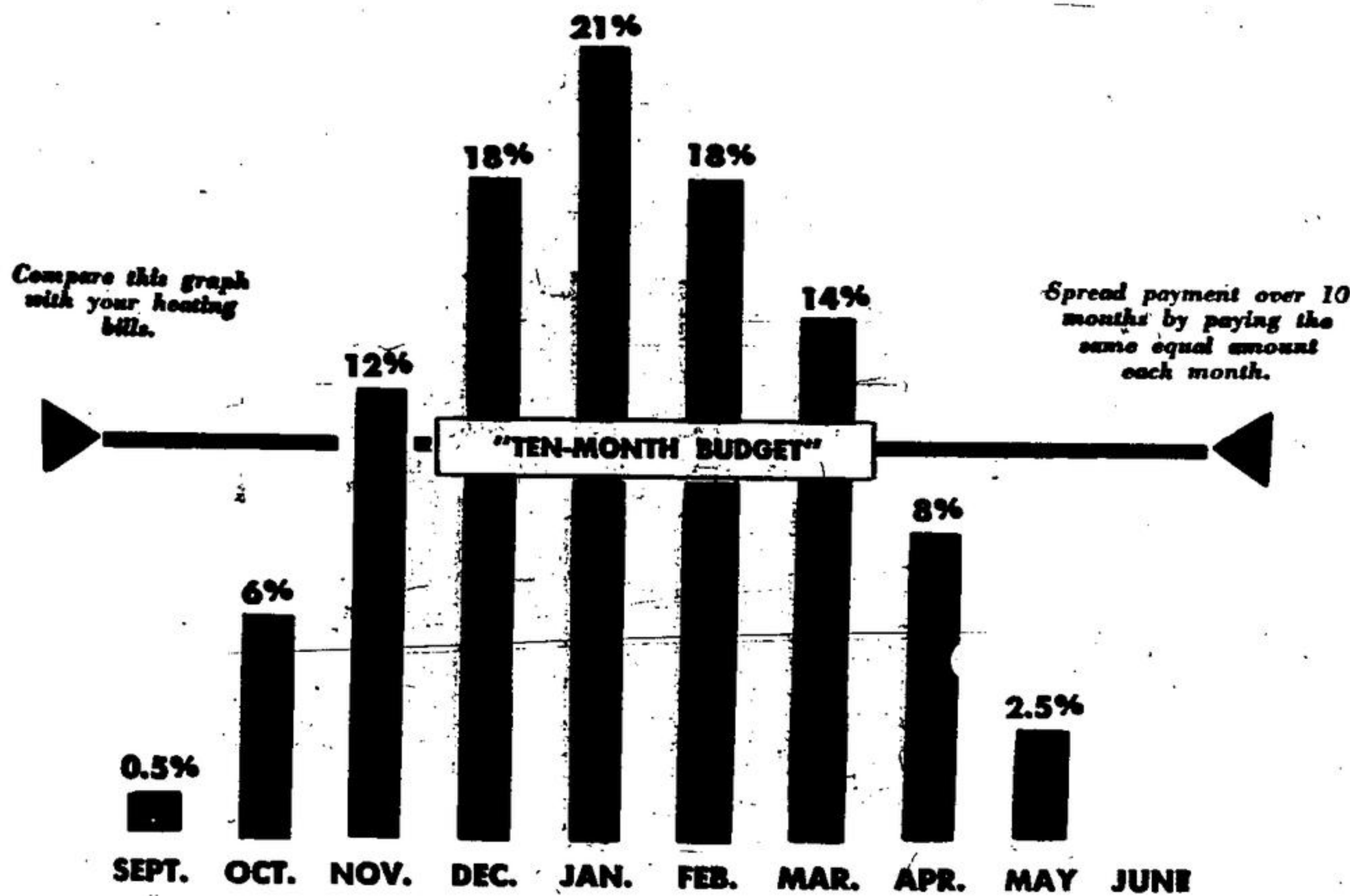
