THREE SEEK HONOURS FOR HALTON DAIRY PRINCESS

Halton dairy groups with representatives present from Acton, Georgetown, Milton, Oakville and Toronto Milk Producers met in Milton on May 16th to discuss ways and means of selecting Halton's representative for the Dairy Queen contest at the Canadian National Exhibition. Other groups represented at this meeting were the

Halton Cream Producers, Halton Federation of Agriculture, and the Halton Junior Farmers.

J. H. Taylor, president of the Halton Federation of Agriculture, was appointed chairman of the county committee, with A. Roy Coulter, as county secretary. While three Halton young ladies have signified their intention of competing for the honour of being Halton's princess in the big competition, further applications will be received up until Monday, June 16.

The three young ladies who have signified their desire of representing Halton in the competition for the Ontario Dairy Queen title and the Overseas trip to Great Britain, are Mary Lou Robinson of Oakville, Mary Lou Taylor of Burlington and Lorna Woodley of Milton. The meeting in Milton on May 16th was convened by J. A. Bell of Guelph, a member of the staff of the dairy branch of the Ontario Dept. of Agriculture. This meeting decided that the Halton princess will be selected by means of a county contest where local contestants will demonstrate their respective proficiencies in preparing and milking a cow and in the handling of milk, sanitation, etc. To this end the following committees were appointed:

Selection: James Marshall, John M. Bird, and J. H. Taylor; Publicity: Barbara Cunningham and A. R. Coulter; Finance: Clifford Brown, Melvin McCullough, Wm. Rayner, Fred Brooks, James Marshall, John M. Bird, J. H. Taylor and Roy F. Ford.

Present plans for the county contest call for its being staged during the last two weeks of July.

Nursing Head Speaker County Nurses' Meeting

The president of the Canadian Nursing Association and assistant professor of public health nursing education, at the University of Toronto, Helen Carpenter, was the guest speaker in Knox Church Hall on Tuesday, May 20th when the Halton Chapter of the Registered Nurses Association held a general meeting. She was introduced by Mrs. Richard Hogan.

Speaking on the International Congress of Nursing, Miss Carpenter said that there were fifty-nine countries represented including ten new countries which had just joined last year. The aim of the congress is to establish uniformity of standards in nursing and to provide an exchange of ideas with lesser developed countries.

Miss Carpenter expressed her admiration for the nurses whose native language is not English who presented papers in English. She was one of five Canadian delegates at the congress held in Rome, Italy, where about 1500 Italian nurses entertained the 3,000 visitors. A report was given on the recent RNAO convention in Toronto and plans were begun for a dinner meeting to be held at the Estaminet, Burlington, in October.

Following slides of Miss Carpenter's tour, refreshments were served by the Royal Circle of the Presbyterian Church.
