 a memento of his stay in town.

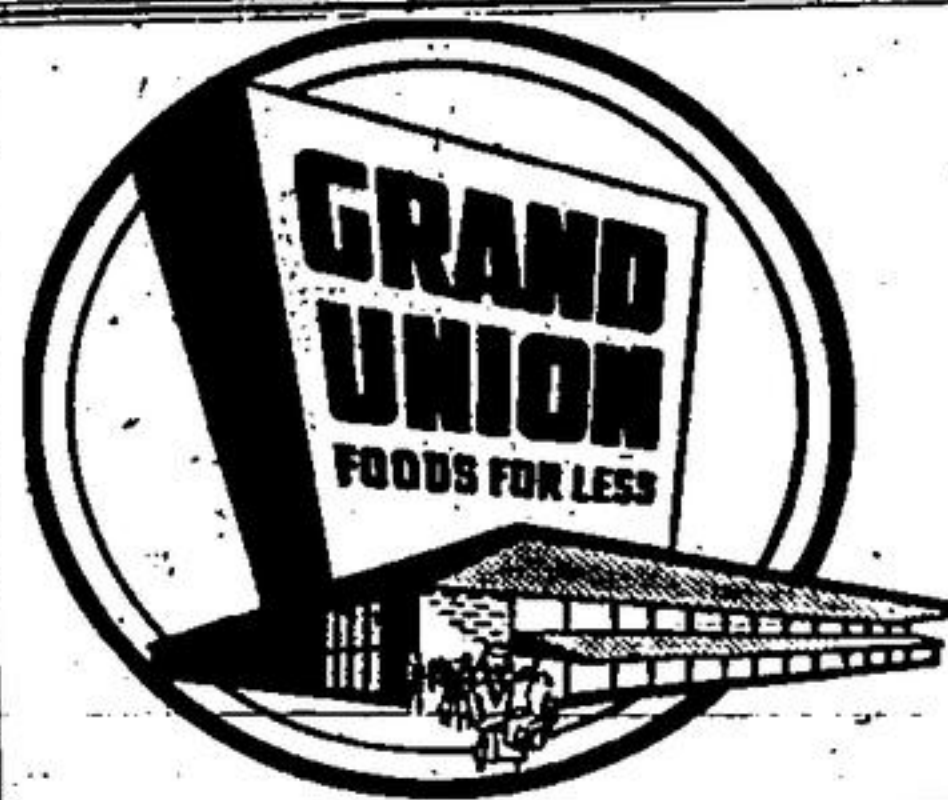
The railway has dispensed with

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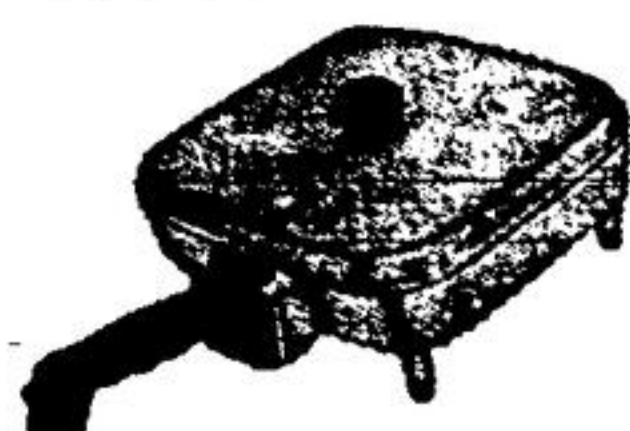

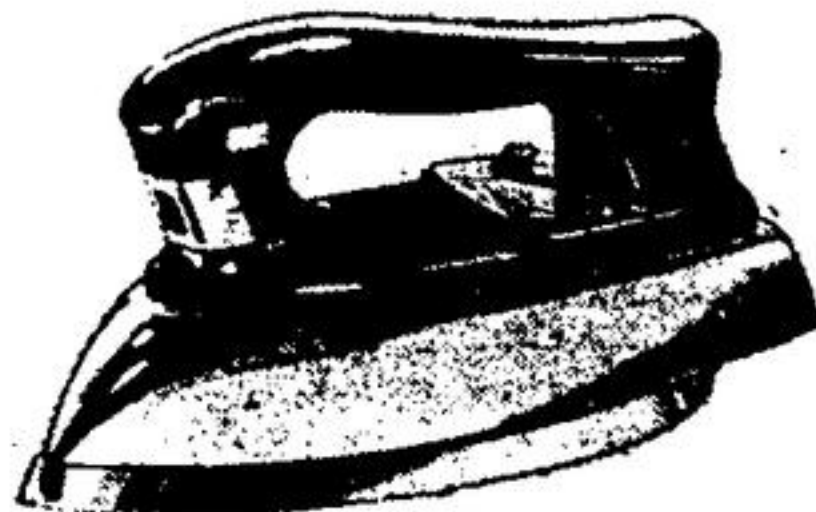
