A committee to investigate the best way to secure new industry for the town and present Georgetown's fine industrial points to companies which have disclosed an interest here, has been formed. The Georgetown Industrial Commission held their inaugural meeting on Wednesday, May 28th with Stan Finlay of Alliance Paper Mills Ltd. elected president of the group for a one year term. John Gunn is acting as secretary until a permanent secretary is appointed.

Four members of council, Mayor Jack Armstrong, Reeve Doug Sargent, Councillors Alf Sykes and Fred Harrison and three Chamber of Commerce members, Jack Critchton, Harold McClure and Harold Baird complete the commission which will meet regularly on the second Thursday of each month.

The desirability of having a personal visitation by members of the commission to companies which have indicated a possible move to town was advanced at the meeting while another decision was to have engraved announcements of the formation of the commission prepared and sent to organizations which might provide leads on prospective industries. Included in such useful organizations would be railways, banks and industrial brokers.

The announcements will be followed by notices that two members of the commission will be making a personal call on a certain date. Members agreed to reserve one day a month for this purpose.

The Commission intends to issue a request to Mr. Wall of the Trade and Industry branch of the Department of Planning and Development to attend a meeting and discuss ways and means of encouraging industry.

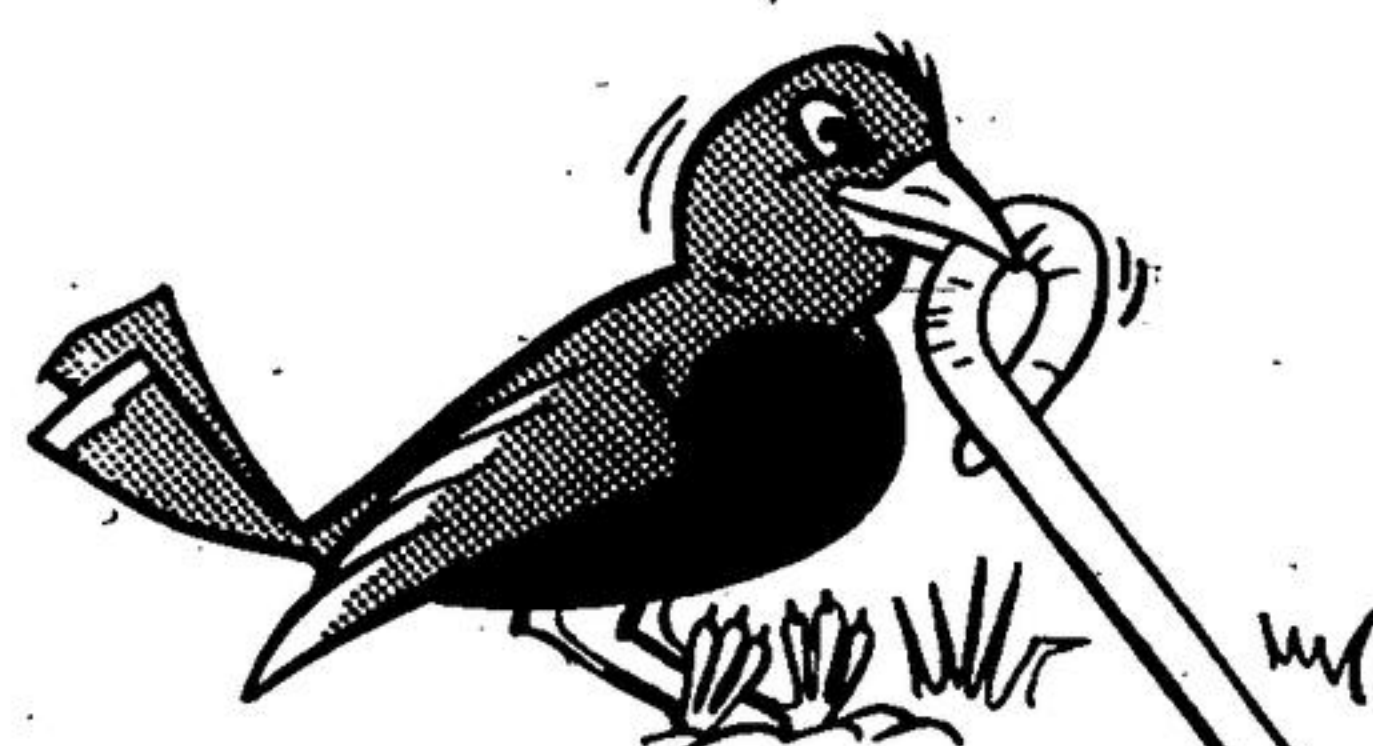

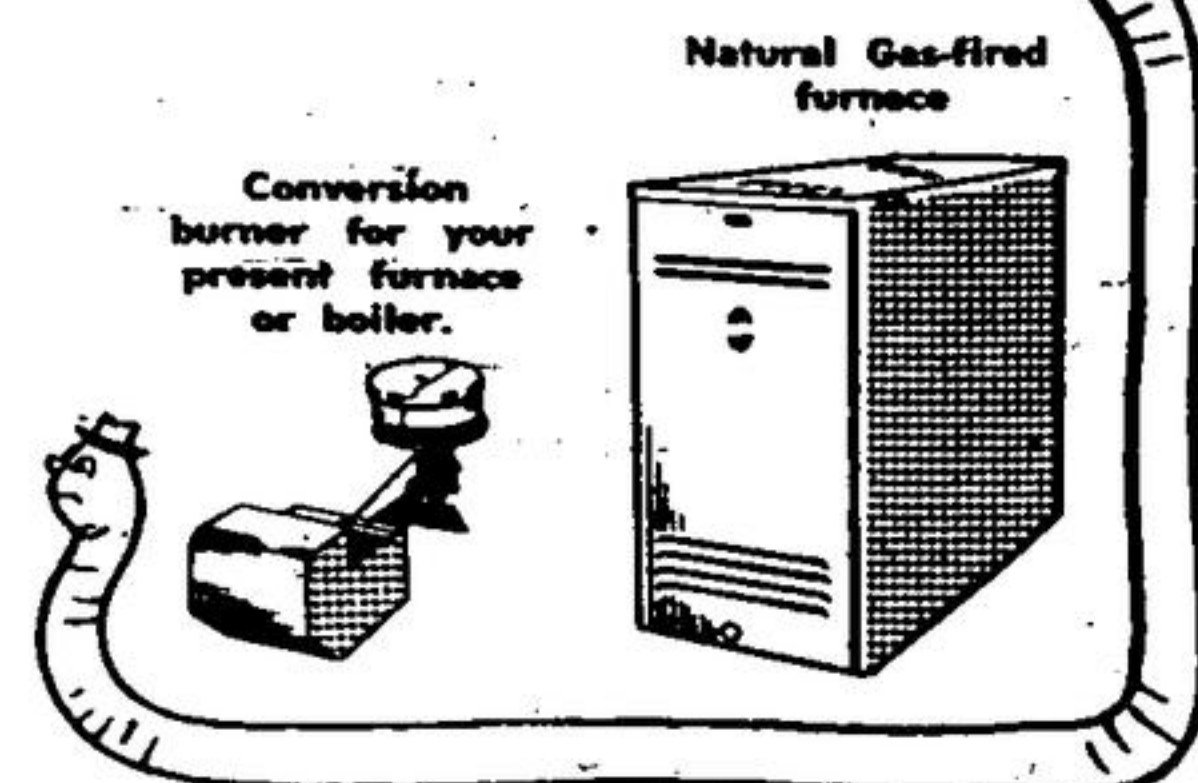
