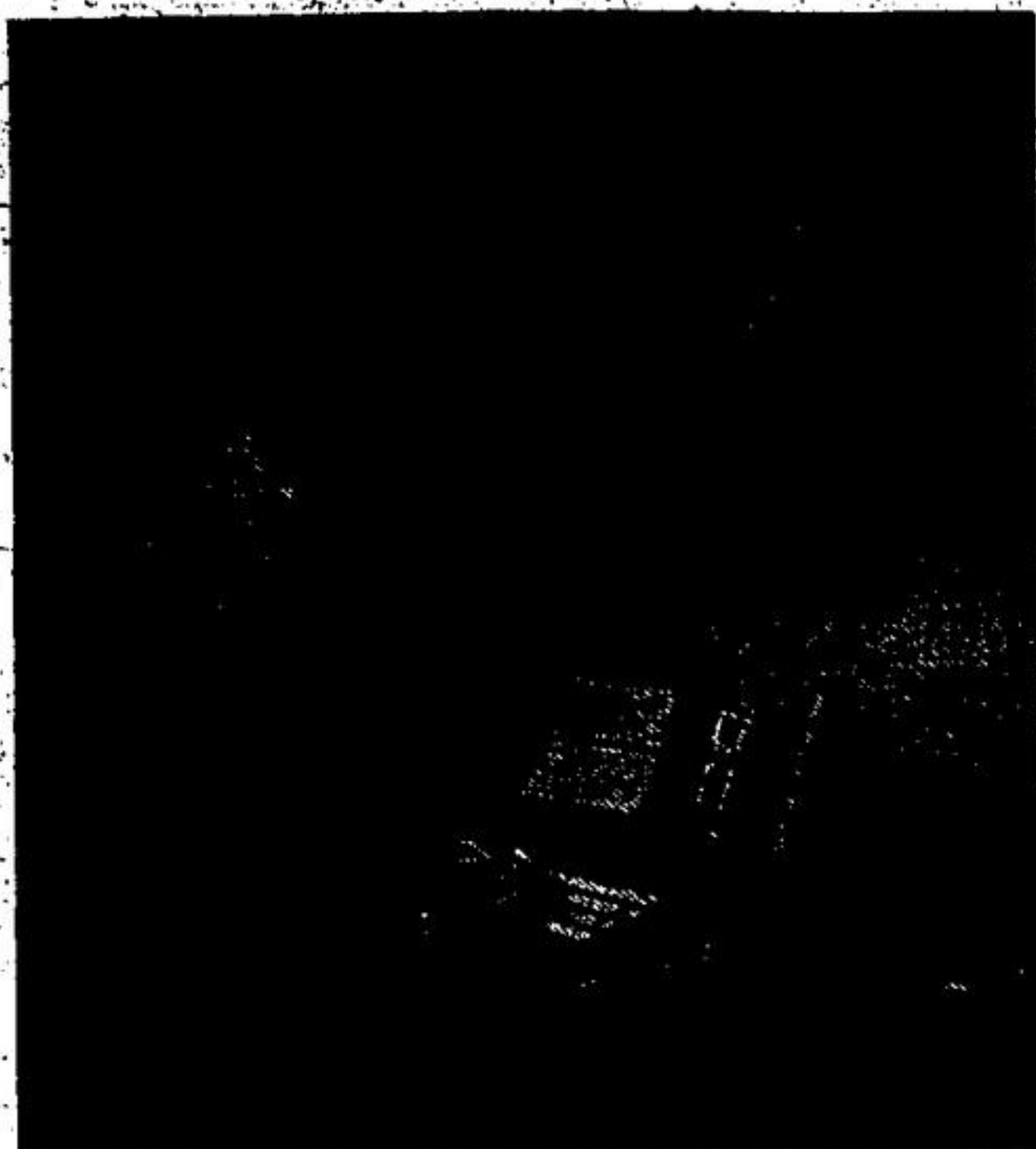
SHORTHORN BRINGS \$2,000 TOPS TORONTO AREA SALE

FARM NEWS

Milk Producers Hear Dairy Commissioner J. E. W.

Halton fluid milk shippers to the Toronto market were out in goodly numbers at the meeting held in the Stewarttown Hall on the evening of May 28th. President Earl Moore of District No. 12, Toronto Milk Producers, assisted by John M. Bird, secretary of the organization, was in charge of the excellent program.

Following a film entitled "Power and Passage," depicting the St. Lawrence Seaway, chairman Moore introduced Everett Biggs, Dairy Commissioner for Ontario, who presented a clear cut picture of the dairy business in Ontario. During the past two years, stated Mr. Biggs, there has been a 282 per cent increase in the consumption of 2 per cent milk in Ontario. Referring to bulk tank transportation he stated that the indications are that by July 1st of this year, over 90 per cent of the 2800 producers to the Toronto milk shed will be marketing their production by this means. Since bulk tank transportation was initiated a total of 226 truckers have received a special course at the Ontario Agricultural College, on grading and handling of milk. Reference was also made by Mr. Biggs, to the necessity for careful and accurate calibration of the tanks. Referring to the dairy industry as a whole, Mr. Biggs stated that while cheese production is down slightly, milk powder output on the other hand is almost twice that of last year. Toronto is the only fluid milk market in Ontario which showed a decrease in consumption of milk during the first three months of this year.

The second speaker of the evening, John W. Pawley, secretary-manager of the Toronto Milk Producers, dealt with local problems on the Toronto market. On June 19th, stated Mr. Pawley, the question of a reduction in trucking rates for bulk milk transportation will be up for arbitration. We are also, he added, making a determined attempt to secure a premium for bulk transported milk.

Others who contributed to this excellent programme included Mrs. Lloyd Davison, whose piano instrumentals were a source of delight to all. It was an excellent meeting and reflects much credit to the executive of District 12, and in particular to secretary John M. Bird whose planning was much in evidence.
