Forecast Six Public Schools When Delrex Building Ends

Georgetown will have six public schools when building is completed in the Delrex subdivision, it was perceived by board chairman, Ray Salter, Wednesday, June 6th, when the board held their regular June meeting at Harrison public school. Explaining the school situation to visitors at the meeting, Mr. Salter said he foresaw schools in the centre of the development and at the Norval and Georgetown's fourth public school is already under construction at the Park.

Answering a question dealing with overcrowding in the future, Mr. Salter said that although it was conceivable that some classes may have to go on a shift schedule again next term due to intensified building in the Delrex area, it was also conceivable that a fifth school would already be started by that time. Department regulations prevent the board from going ahead with another school until housing in that area near Mountainview Road is a reality.

Re portable classrooms, Mr. Salter said that the board had decided against them for numerous reasons, citing the heating problem as the most difficult factor to overcome. If run off the heating system serving the main building the boiler may not be able to handle the additional load, and if an individual space heater was used the room could become a fire hazard. The fire chief in Windsor has condemned all portable classrooms using the latter system.

An earlier report by the county public school inspector L. A. Skuce confirmed the board's opinion that shift classes for a short time was not harmful to the pupils' education.

The location of the Park public school has been changed slightly since unstable ground was encountered in load tests under the proposed site. The new location for the school is closest to the park proper.

A P.A. system will be installed in Wrigglesworth public school during the summer holidays. The system is Electro-Vox and is similar to that now in use at Harrison. A duplicator was also ordered for Park School.

The board agreed to rent two rooms at Harrison public school to Grace Baptist Church for a vacation school to be started some time in July.

The next regular meeting of the board has been set for June 25th instead of July 2nd.

Robbers Get Receipts In Creamery Break-In

Police are investigating the theft of approximately \$640 taken sometime over the week-end from Georgetown Creamery.

Cst. E. L. Rollins who is handling the investigation said that the entry to the building was gained through a window at the rear of the building. Once inside, the thieves forced the door of the office by using a hacksaw blade.

The occurrence was reported to the police by the bookkeeper Gregory Dura who discovered the

break-in at 9 o'clock Saturday morning.

At 9:30 a.m. on Tuesday, June 3rd a break and entry was reported at Hunters Inn on Mountainview Rd. in which \$50 in 25 cent pieces was taken. An investigation conducted by Police Chief Roy Haley and Cst. Rollins resulted in an arrest shortly after the theft and the stolen money has been returned.
