Mayor Armstrong pointed out that one of the reasons for added policing would be adoption of the uniform traffic ticket, a government regulation which makes it obligatory for an offending motorist to be stopped at the scene of his offence.

"Do we have to wait for a crime outbreak to decide we need more police?" said Cr. Harrison, pointing out Georgetown has been fortunate in having a clean record. A town is well policed when policemen have nothing to do, he said. Cr. Sykes said the man suggested was not on a list of 14 prior applicants the police committee had decided to contact, and that as a committee member he had heard of no meeting to interview applicants.

With Crs. Harrison and Elliott and Deputy Reeve Gray in favour, the hiring motion was lost.

Passing a \$500 contribution to Georgetown's new industrial commission, Cr. Hyde... remarked that he does not favour the town being a promoting body for any subdivision and said that if the town is instrumental in bringing an industry, any expenses should be borne by the property seller. Cr. Sykes said the Delrex agreement says industry will only be credited to Delrex if directly brought to town by the firm, and otherwise would not apply on the 60-40 ratio.
