(continued from page 1) Mayor Armstrong pointed out that one of the reasons for added policing would be adoption of the uniform traffic ticket, a government regulation which makes it obligatory for an offending motorist to be stopped at the scene of his offence.

"Do we have to wait for a crime outbreak to decide we need more police?" said Cr. Harrison, pointing out Georgetown has been fortunate in having a clean record. A town is well policed when police-

men have nothing to do, he said. Cr. Sykes said the man suggested was not on a list of 14 prior applicants the police committee had decided to contact, and that as a committee member he . had heard of no meeting to interview
