WHAT COUNCIL DID

Plan To Convert Home Medical-Dental Offices

The former John Bell home at 79 Main St. S. may be converted into medical and dental offices if plans being formulated by Dr. Jack Kerby and Dr. J. H. Chamberlain are approved by Georgetown Planning Board.

Appearing at Monday's council meeting, Dr. Kerby and Mr. Bell, now a Montreal resident, explained that the house has been sold, contingent on a building permit being issued for alterations to the building. The house stands in an area zoned as residential, and issuance of a permit had been withheld by building inspector Joseph Gibbons, pending a decision by the planning board and council.

While a majority of council seemed to favour establishment of the clinic, opinion was that no decision could be made until the planning board had dealt with the question and made a recommendation to council. Several councillors expressed the fear that allowing an infraction of the zoning by-law would set a precedent, and that some means should be found within the framework of the by-law to allow establishment of the clinic.

Cr. Fred Harrison argued for issuance of a permit, claiming that a gas station had been established in another town location against the wishes of residents.

The matter was turned back to the planning board for their decision.
