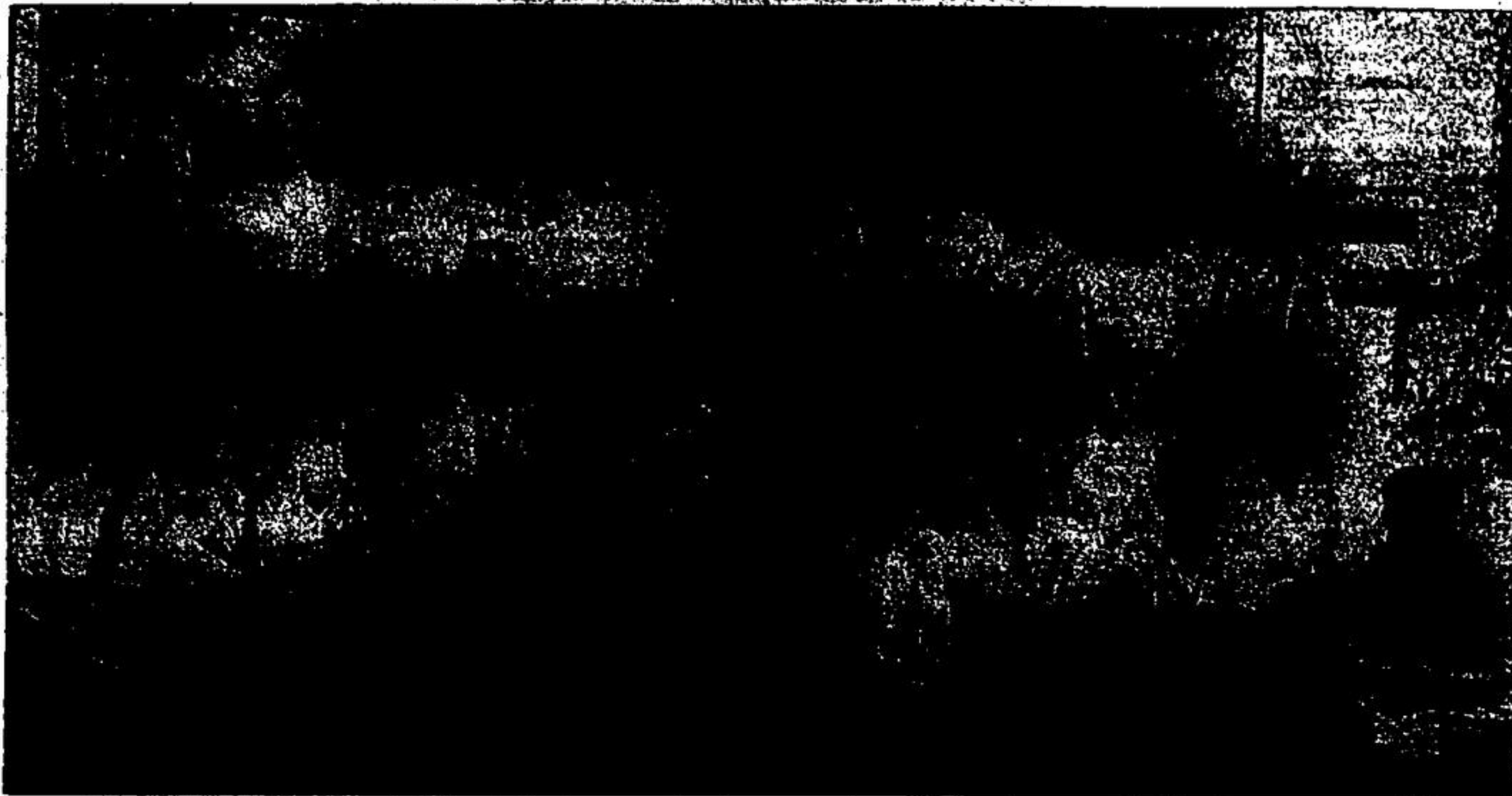

5. Walk, don't run, when you leave the curb.



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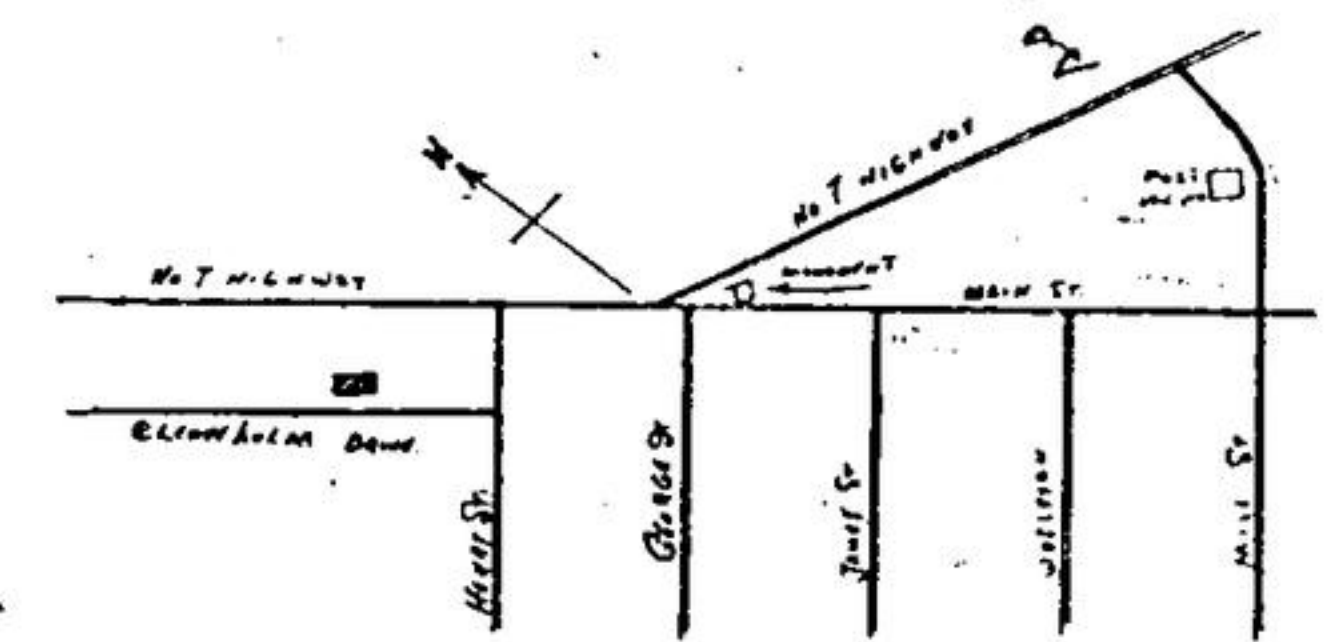
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ZONING UNAFFECTED BY PLANNED CREDIT DAM

THE NEW WATER LEVEL RESULTING FROM A SIXTY-EIGHT FOOT HIGH DAM PROPOSED FOR HUNGRY HOLLOW ON THE NINTH LINE BY THE CREDIT VALLEY CONSERVATION AUTHORITY WILL HAVE NO EFFECT ON ZONING IN THE DELREX SUBDIVISION IT WAS AGREED LAST NIGHT WHEN OFFICIALS MET WITH MEMBERS OF THE PLANNING BOARD AT THE MUNICIPAL OFFICE TO STUDY A CONTOUR MAP OF THE AREA.

The dam considered by the board is to be constructed along the road line and extend close to 1200 feet with part of the road running along its top. The reservoir created will cover two hundred acres of land. Field officer Ted Suter represented the conservation authority at the meeting also attended by the chairman of pollution and flood control, Mr. Parker, of Acton.

The dam is one of three proposed by the Authority, the other two to be constructed at Orangeville and Silvercreek.

LORNE SCOTS OFFICERS HAVE TRAINING SCHEME

Some thirty officers from all over the Lorne Scots regimental area attended a four day officers training scheme at the summer cottage of Lt. Col. John R. Barber on Lake Muskoka near Port Carling on the weekend, the training period lasting from Friday, June 21st until Monday.
