HALTON BUSINESSMAN SOLDIER TO OTTAWA POST

Many people throughout Halton County will be interested in the choice of the Government's new associate deputy trade minister, a Halton man, James A. Roberts. Mr. Roberts is an investment dealer, president of James A. Roberts, Ltd., an investment firm, is also vice president of the Halton and Peel Trust and Savings Co., and a partner of Roberts, Stanley and Co., a public relations and marketing firm. He is chairman of the board of trustees of the Canadian Association of Investment Clubs and in 1951 was president of the Canadian Exporters Association. He has long been actively interested in the work of the Retarded Children's Association in South Halton. He has been president of Oakville Progressive Conservative Association and a member of the county executive of that group.

Enlisting on the outbreak of war in 1939, Mr. Roberts rose to the rank of brigadier, and commanded the 8th Infantry Brigade overseas. A number of local men served under him in this brigade. Prime Minister Diefenbaker announced yesterday in Ottawa his appointment as deputy trade minister, a \$16,500 a year post, vacant for about a year.

It is understood that Mr. Diefenbaker wants the 50 year old Mr. Roberts, for a definite purpose, to take up some of the routine chores in the department, and also to oversee a new branch to be established there to aid small business. Such a branch was forecast in the Throne Speech at the opening of Parliament but for a time there was some question as to whether it would be established in the trade or finance departments. The Retail Merchants' Association of Canada, which proposed the branch, asked that it be empowered to make loans to small businessmen to help them meet competition from big department and chain stores.

REV. CLIFFORD WAITE TO BE INDUCTED

The induction service for the Lion's Head charge of the United Church of Canada was held on Thursday, July 2nd, where the Rev. Clifford Waite, DFC, MA, B.Ed., BD, succeeded the Rev. William Slinn as minister in charge.

Mr. Waite comes from the Burlington area where he has served for the past five years as student minister of the Lowville and Zimman United Churches. Graduating in May from Emmanuel College, Toronto, he was ordained into the ministry of the United Church of Canada at the conference held earlier this month in Hamilton.

Well-known to rural audiences through his CBC broadcasts for Farm Radio Forum, Mr. Waite brings to his present responsibilities in the Bruce Peninsula a rich background of experience.

During the war he flew 36 missions with the RCAF bomber command over Germany and received the Distinguished Flying Cross for "courage, and devotion to duty." Prior to becoming secretary-manager of Farm Forum he was assistant director of the Hamilton Community Chest, Director of Instructors for the Frontier College, (himself serving in railroad and construction camps of Northern Ontario and British Columbia as a "labourer-teacher" for several seasons), and for six months conducted Folk schools in various parts of Ontario for the Ontario Folk School Council.

A graduate of McMaster University, Hamilton, and Acadia University, Wolfville, Nova Scotia, he received his high school teachers' certificate for the Maritime provinces and taught at Horton Academy, Wolfville. His wife, a farm girl from Oxford County, is also a graduate of McMaster and is a professional librarian. They have three children.

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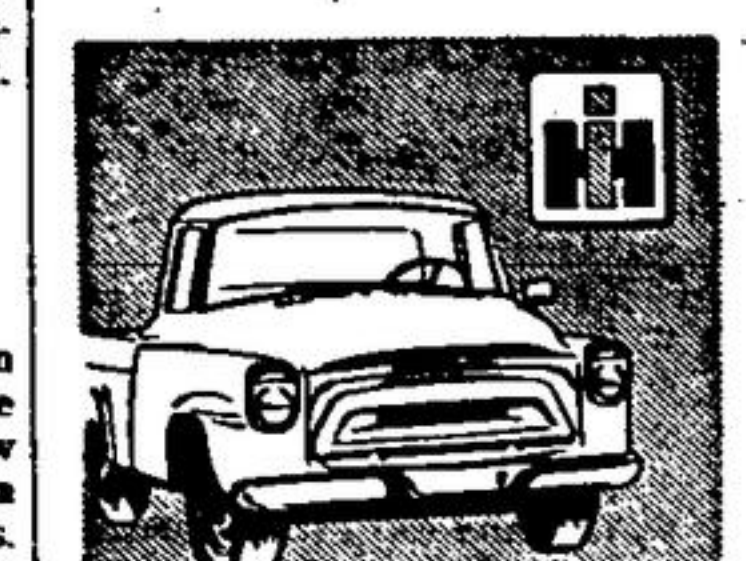
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
