Three County Officials
Speak at Lions Meeting

Three county officials were speakers when the Lions Club was entertained on July 8th at a buffet supper in the garden at the home of Mr. and Mrs. Walter Gray, 6 Church Street.

Reeve William Card of Oakville, who is warden of the county this year, explained the fauces of government which come under county jurisdiction, health, roads, welfare and courts being among them. He complimented the club on its public service work, particularly mentioning the fine swimming pool which the Lions have completed payments for.

Dr. A. F. Bull, medical officer of health for the county, outlined how this department has grown since its organization ten years ago, and cited statistics which show the value of organized public health. Diphtheria has been wiped out in Canada, he said, TB deaths have decreased from 180 per hundred thousand population to 4, and infant mortality has been cut in half in a decade.

Another speaker was Jim Powell, chief inspector for the Health Unit, who explained how work in his department has increased with large-scale housing subdivisions in the county and introduction of plumbing licences. An "original" with the unit when it was formed, Mr. Powell said the staff has grown to 10 from the original two in 1947.

Assessment Commissioner Jos. Gibbons acted as chairman for the evening, and the new Lions president Dick Miller announced that the club would be discussing a jamboree at the next meeting, which is planned at the home of Harold McClure later this month.

Mayor Jack Armstrong also spoke, briefly, expressing the town's gratitude to the club for completing the swimming pool payments, and particularly mentioning a club member, Dick Licata, for his outstanding work in promoting the building of the pool.

George Glassford's orchestra provided music for a sing-song later in the evening. A gift was presented to Mrs. Gray the next day in appreciation of her work as hostess to the Lions.

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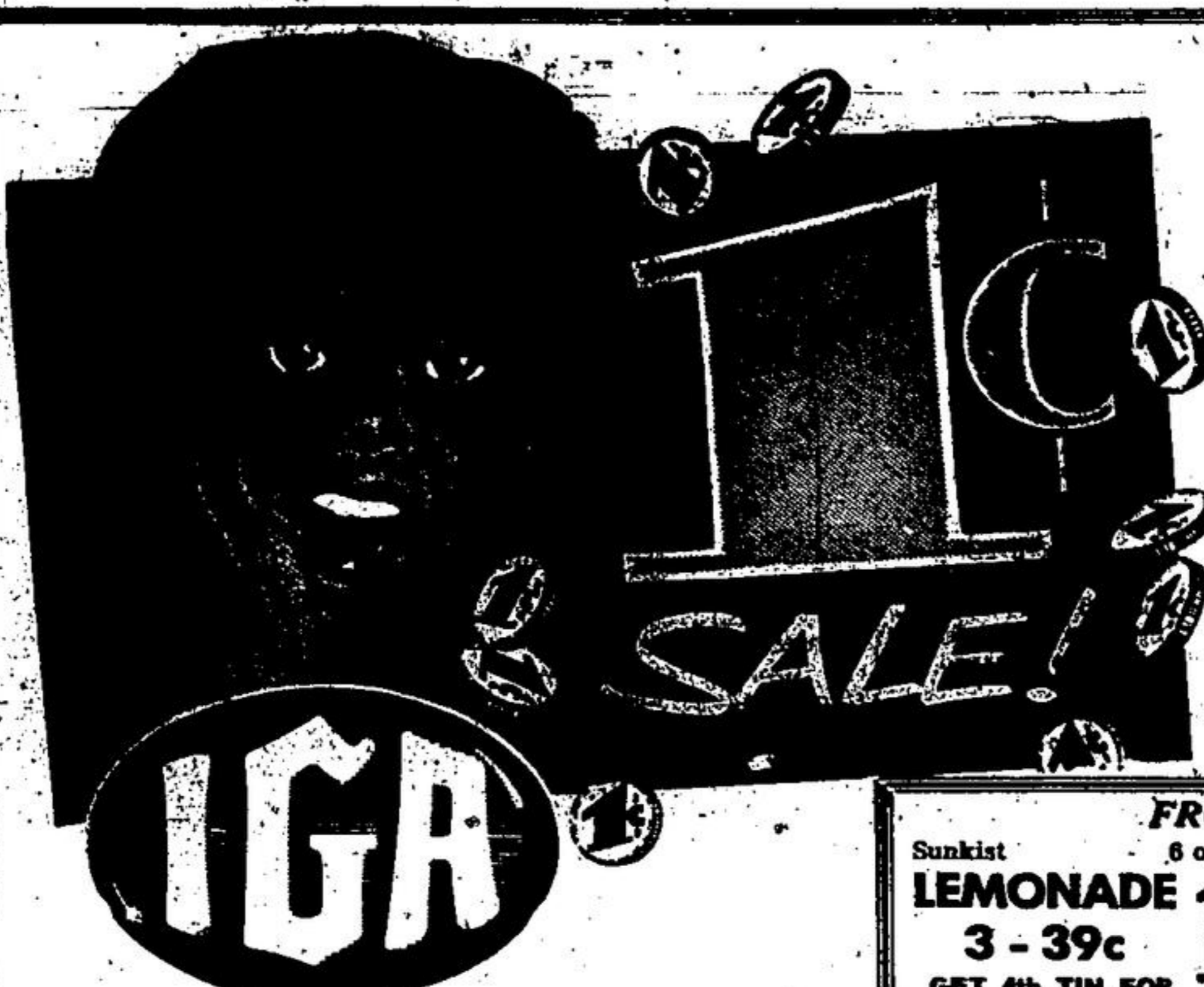

CRITICIZES LETTING OF
SEPARATE SCHOOL CONTRACT
July 15, 1958

Dear Sir:

Believing that the procedure used in the letting of the contract for the Separate School in Georgetown would be of interest to a number of citizens of Georgetown, I am writing to outline this in the next few paragraphs.

In the first place tenders were called for June 24th, at which time five construction firms submitted prices with two local firms being lowest and second lowest bidders.

The lowest bidder was offered the contract providing that he could complete the school by September 15th, which he refused to agree to as it is impossible to complete a school in two months.

With this development the school board gave the contract to a Toronto firm who was not one of the original bidders at a price Sixteen Thousand Dollars (\$16,000.00) more than the low bidder.

We, the second lowest bidder, having gone to the expense of preparing a tender, and with a crew of local men, seventy five percent of whom are Roman Catholic, and prepared to start the work immediately feel that the least the Separate School Board could have done would have been to ask us and the other bidders if we could meet their required completion date.

As a further deduction, from the actions of the board we feel that if they have so much money to spend out of town, they surely will not require any special concessions from the Public School Board or the Town Council.
