### **Vote Completion of** Water Firms Report. on Town Supply

Aftermath of a discussion last week with J. W. Kirk of International Water Supply, Ltd., council on Monday took the advice of the water committee and okayed the firm completing its investigation into future water source and supply in town.

A week ago Mr. Kirk reported a possible million gallons a day in addition to the present two wells which can possibly supply 2% million gallons daily, although current consumption is in the miltion gallon region. His company's research has cost the town \$8756 to date and he said another \$500 would cover cost of final tests to complete the report.

Monday's vote allotted a maximum of \$500 for the extra test-

"This company has been criticized somewhat for the amount of mone yspent" said water chairman Ern Hyde in making his motion, "but they are giving us a complete report on what water we have, and it is valuable information for the town to have."

Council ordered tenders called for sanitary sewers in the new park subdivision (this subject to the Municipal Board approving a debenture issue) and for roads and watermains.

Cr. Fred Harrison reported a delay in advertising land which the town will sell on Maple Ave., until a proper description of the property is obtained. His committee is now considering offering the land for sale in separate lots, rather than as one parcel, he said.

"We've had our first response from action of the new Industrial Commission," Reeve Doug Sargent reported, as he told of an industrial enquiry from a bank which has no branch in George-

The bank itself is also considering locating here, he informed

Reviewing of accounts brought three questions of cost to the fore. Cr. Hyde asked for a future report on cost of operating the bulldozer and sanitary landfill, as a repair bill for the dozer was paid. Cr. Harrison submitted a \$48 account for cutting grass and weeds at the park and said this could be a weekly occurrence and council should consider buying a mower

for this purpose. "Some of our worst weed patches are on town property," he said, "and we'll either have to spend money and keep them cut, or turn our heads when ratepayers let their weeds grow."

Cr. Harrison also suggested that town employees who have home phone bills paid by the town should submit a monthly list of long distance calls chargeable to the town, for checking.
