Town Will Sell Maple Park District Properties

Council reversed its opinion last week on selling of municipal properties. A motion that none be sold until all town-owned properties were listed, and those advertised for sale which council deemed advisable, was rescinded on the proposal of Cr. Fred Harrison.

A motion was then proposed by Cr. Harrison that any property could be sold if it were advertised at least once in the Herald, with a third motion that property fronting in Maple Ave. behind the Georgetown Dairy be so advertised.

The motions were a result of a recent offer to purchase the land for \$3,000. Council filed the application at that time because of the restricting legislation on the books. Some time previously, offers had also been received for the same property from Irwin Noble, owner of the adjoining dairy, and Al Norton, who proposed to build a commercial building on the property.

Two councillors, Reeve Sargent and Cr. Gunn, sided with Cr. Alfred Sykes in his opposition to selling the land for any price. Cr. Sykes claims the land should be developed for parkland and that it is an ideal location for garbage disposal by the landfill method.

Possibility of the town selling 18 building lots on a newly-created sub-division in the region of the new Park public school was also suggested by Cr. Harrison. The lots front on three new town streets, Princess Anne Drive, Harold Street and Hyde Park Drive.

Cr. Harrison said that the money realized from sale of the lots would help materially in paying cost of sewer and roads which must be installed for the new school.

Mayor Armstrong pointed out that it might not be feasible to use the money for sewers, because these could be installed under local improvement, and council would first have to decide about this before a proper value would be placed on the lots. The matter was delayed until further investigation on this phase of the plan.

Cost estimates for the area were supplied by town engineer, Wm. Carr. Sewers will cost \$16,300, watermain \$20,600 and roads \$11,000 he said.
